Death of Robert Reynolds

One of the village's most respected citizens in the person of Mr. Robert Reynolds passed away on Tuesday morning of this week. Mr. Reynolds has been ailing for the past three years but it was only during the past seven months that his case became serious, since the thirteenth of January of this year when he suffered a stroke while on the streets of Hagersville. Deceased was in his 68th year.

Mr. Reynolds has conducted his farm on the edge of the village during the past twelve years, coming here from the vicinity of Hagersville. During his residence here he has become well and favorably known and by his genial manner and kind disposition, universally liked.

Besides his wife he leaves to mourn his loss, five sons, namely, George and James at home, Charles and Wilbur of Hagersville, and Roy, of Morris, Sask. One brother, George, of Varenay, and a sister, Mrs. Bird, of Iowa, U. S. A., also survive him.
