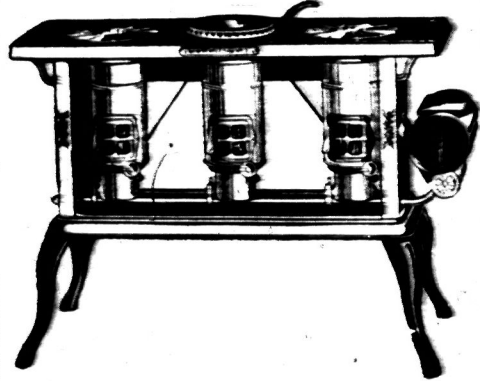

The Annual Walker Picnic

The tenth Annual Reunion of the Walker family was held at Hickory Beach, Nanticoke, on Wednesday, August 13th, 1919, about one hundred and fifty being present. Although the family is widely scattered, each year finds a large representation present, of those from a distance. Guests were present from Toronto, Hamilton, Buffalo, New Liscomb, Regina, Hagersville, Jarvis, Rainham, Springvale and Port Dover.

About 11 o'clock the crowd began to gather and soon an interesting game of baseball was under way. After dinner a second game of baseball was played by teams representing the single and married men, the former captained by Elvin Pond of Sanduski and the latter by Geo. Walker of Hamilton. Although the single men started out by gaining an apparently safe margin of runs, the experience of the married men enabled them to overcome the lead and win the game by a single run. Alfred Kendrick of Buffalo proved an impartial and capable umpire.

The Sports committee arranged a very full program of races and games and much later it was shown in the various contests. The names of the winners of the different events appears below.

After the sports program was concluded the program committee then arranged a brief program consisting of addresses by Rev. Mr. Mercer of Chesapeake. An address of welcome to the members of the family who had served overseas was delivered by J. Frank Walker of Hamilton and responded to by Leo Pond of Sanduski. John Walker of Sanduski, in a few well chosen remarks, then referred to the fact that E. F. Walker had acted as Secretary from the time that the reunion was first organized and had been largely responsible for its success throughout that time.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to him for the successful way he had conducted the affairs of the organization. The chairman, C. E. Walker, of Regina, then gave a short history of the family and referred to the fact that this was the first picnic at which representatives of the fifth generation had been present. The original Walker family consisting of John and Martha Walker and nine children came to Canada from England in 1857. Three other children were born in Canada, the twelve, seven sons and five daughters all grown to manhood and womanhood. Ten of these were living at the time of the first reunion in 1909, and were all present. Seven are still living and were all present at the picnic this year.

A feeling of sadness pervaded the gathering this year because of the recent death of J. G. Kendrick of Buffalo, who had always taken such an active interest in the picnic in previous years.

The program was concluded by assembling all the members of the "original" family in a circle while they were surrounded by a larger circle of children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren who sang, "Blest be the tie that binds," "For they are jolly good fellows," and "God save the King."

Comparison of Different Kinds of Winter Stores for Bees

Experimental Farms Note.

In the experiments with bees at the Experimental Farms, it was early recognized that the use of the winter stores is an important factor in successful wintering, and the experiments have confirmed this. Experiments at the Central Experimental Farm indicate that clover honey (alike and white clover) makes reliable stores for wintering, but poor results have followed the use of stores that granulate hard during the winter. A colony wintered on dandelion honey came out in spring very weak; the bees in the granulated hard stores and the bees had uncaped it but could use very little of it. In some years a mixed honey that comes largely from clover, sweet clover, and other plants, granulate hard with the same result and causes heavy loss. Buckwheat honey has been found wholesome, but some of the other honeys gathered in the fall have been found unwholesome, especially in marshy places in Nova Scotia, and have caused dysentery and death. In one season in Northern Ontario, the fall honey was not capped over and failed to open and sorted, causing dysentery and heavy loss. Honey containing juices collected by the bees from over-ripe fruit killed a colony before spring, so also did cane syrup used as an exclusive food for wintering. Syrup made from refined sugar, two parts sugar to one of water, fed to the bees in the early fall, has given fairly good results as an exclusive winter food, and has been found to be the best practical corrective for stores that are slightly unwholesome. Year after year at the Central Farm, colonies on natural stores that have been fed liberally with this syrup come out stronger in spring than those that have wintered on the natural stores alone. Syrup made from raw cane sugar has given less satisfactory results than that made from refined sugar.
