Walpole Pioneer Passes Away

There died in the village on Friday last one of the oldest and most respected pioneers of Walpole in the person of Mr. William Lindsay, aged ninety four years.

The late Mr. Lindsay was born in the Township of Esqueving, Haldimand County, in 1825, and moved to this Township in 1847, settling on a farm near Hagersville which has been his continuous residence for seventy two years, with the exception of the past few months when he moved to this village with his son W. D.

An 1850 the late Mr. Lindsay was united in marriage to Dorothy Mahady, who predeceased him some thirty one years ago. Seven children blessed this union, of whom the following survive:—David, of Walpole; Robert M. of Balsburn, Sask.; Mrs. R. W. Smith of Jarvis; William J. Jarvis; and Francis S. of Hagersville. He is also represented by thirty grand-children, forty-six great-grand-children, and two great-great-grand-children.

The funeral was held on Sunday from his son's residence with a short service at the house and interment at the Hagersville cemetery, the Rev. G. R. Wreford, of St. Paul's church, Jarvis, officiating. Six of the deceased's grandsons acted as pallbearers.

The relatives have the sincere sympathy of the whole community in their bereavement.

U.F.O.—U.F.W.O.

One of the greatest benefits of our movement is the awakening that has come to us in regard to the possibilities for National usefulness, that have existed and do exist among Rural Folk. Heretofore, we have acted as if brawn and muscle were the only requisites for Country people—the few brainy folk who remained on the farm were pitied because of the limitations of their talents. The other industries are indebted to us for their best workers. How often does the prominent man in politics, law, medicine, business, any or every line, claim the Farm as his birthplace.

Now we are finding that our business is not necessarily confined to manual labor. A few more years of blindness, and the dictionary definition of Peasantry would have been literally applicable to us. Have you ever looked up that definition? "Peasant—one engaged in Rural Pursuits."

But we are awake—not all of us—but enough to disturb the slumbers of all but those who must be descended from the Seven Sleepers.

I met one such one evening—a man who even yet seems to cling to the idea that in the natural order of things, he MUST BE hands, all hands, and while rumours of what we are doing have reached his ears they have not penetrated to his inner consciousness, and one is reminded of the truth of the old adage—"None are so blind as those who won't see"—which sentence may be paraphrased to embrace every faculty man possesses.

We had mentioned that FARMERS were in charge of the exportation of wheat to Britain and the Allies—that not only national but world-wide recognition of the right of the farmers in common with men of all other crafts to manage their own business had been accorded. But not having read in his party organ that our Western Folk had received that recognition of their ability he absolutely refused to credit the statement.

The trouble is that these people are so hard to reach! They are afraid to read anything but a party paper. Indeed it does not seem possible for them to think in terms other than the two old hackneyed ones.

One writes me that we are Grits—and another finds that we are "Too Conservative." The viewpoint makes all the difference. That one calls every view differing from the Family tradition idea, "Grit" he knows no other term! And this one calls all such views, "Tory!"

But we are learning, really learning that, after all, whatever concerns the nation, concerns us—that the nation's business cannot prosper if managed by the rains that have long since pondered into dust any more than our farm affairs so managed could prosper. Thought, then action; action must be co-operative, and is therefore written CO-OPERATION—Co-operation, power, progress and ultimately, prosperity. To the Farmer? Yes—but not to him alone. His, is one, cannot repeat it too often, THE INDUSTRY of the country, and therefore "rural prosperity" spells "national prosperity"—nor can national prosperity in an agricultural country be attained in any other way.
