Trains Taken off

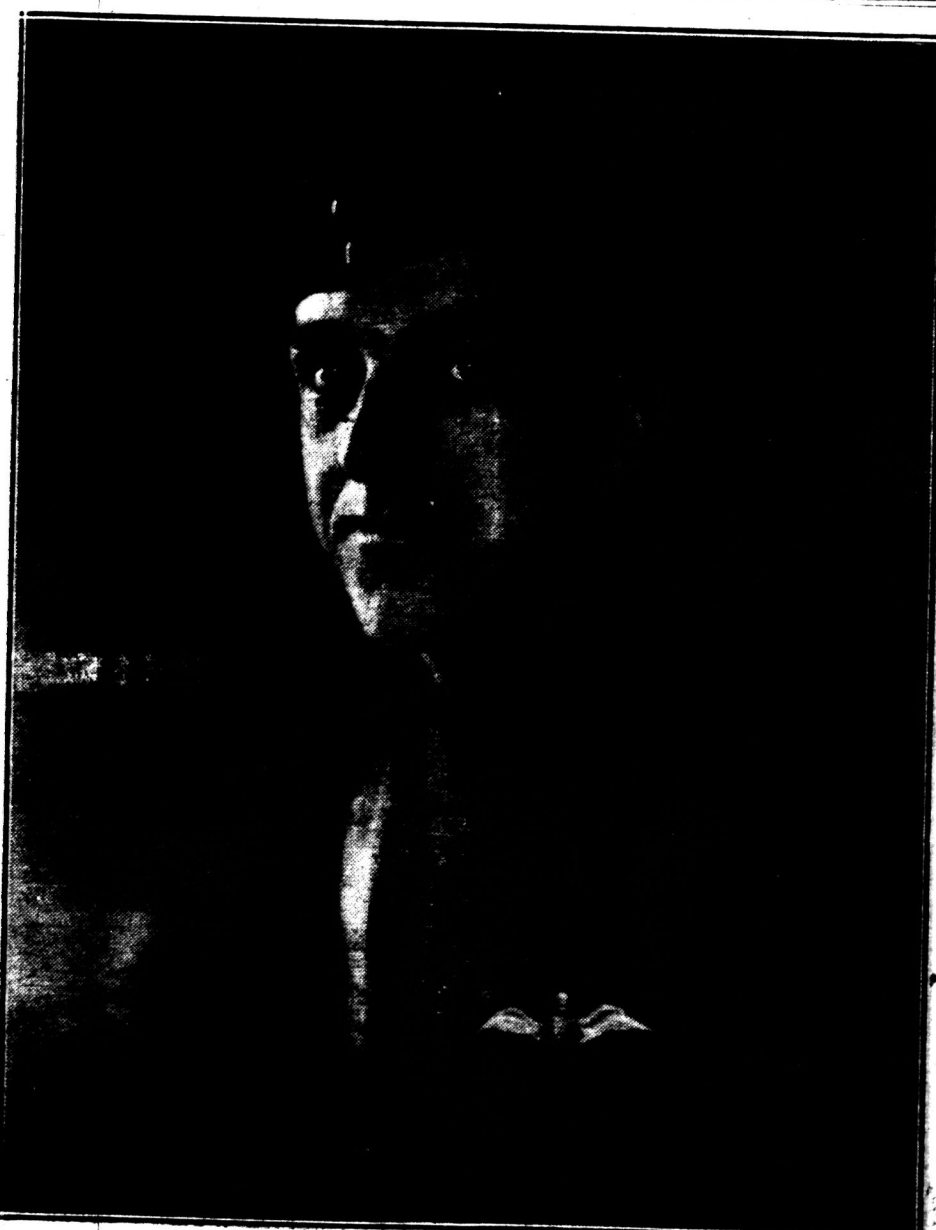
One mail a day is the luck of Jarvis-onians since Monday last. The 11 o'clock morning express from Hamilton, and which returns from St. Thomas at 5.10 clock p. m., has been taken off entirely. The Port Dover train lays in Canfield Junction for the day, returning at night to Port Dover. Up to the present the London papers have not reached the village until evening. The rural route mail drivers now leave on their trips, with the previous days' mail at nine o'clock in the morning.

Death of William Lemon

There died in Buffalo on November 21, 1919, William Edgar Lemon, in his 56th year.
The late William Lemon was born in Woodhouse at the Winding Hill near Port Dover on January 22nd, 1862. He acquired his public school education at Wiggins and Tyrell schools. He then went to the high school at Port Dover and afterwards to the Model school at Ingersoll, finally securing his second class Normal certificate at Ottawa. He engaged in public school teaching at Varennes, Rockford and Hartford. In 1888 he was married to Mary E. Jaques, of Varennes, two sons being given to the union, Bert and Rothwell. While at Hartford he had the misfortune to lose his wife and shortly later his youngest son. Mr. Lemon then entered the drug business at Brantford with Mr. Frank Merrill. In 1898 he was married to Miss Edith Slaght, of Brantford, later removing to Buffalo where he has conducted a successful drug business except during the last three years when he has been living retired on account of ill health, suffering from Bright's disease. For two months' previous to his death he was confined to his bed.
The late Mr. Lemon was a prominent worker in a number of fraternal societies. He leaves to mourn his loss a widow and one son, Dr. A. B. Lemon, professor in the Buffalo University of Pharmacy, and two sisters, Mrs. Jas. Priest of Rockford, and Mrs. W. Mason, of Hagersville.
The funeral was held at his late residence at the Masonic Temple, Buffalo, on Sunday, Nov. 23. The body was brought to Hagersville on Monday morning; interment taking place at the English church cemetery Jarvis the same afternoon.

Morocco Lecture

The illustrated Lecture entitled "Days in Sunset Land" descriptive of a Tour to Morocco, the Canary Islands and Madeira by the Rev. Godfrey Wreford, M. A., F.R.G.S., will be postponed from Dec. 9th to Dec. 16th, and will take place at the St. Paul's Schoolroom at 8 o'clock.
Morocco is one of the least known countries of the world at the present time, and its romantic story of the days of its Corsairs, and Pirate ships which long were the scourge of the Mediterranean, its white walled cities and towns, its lofty snow capped mountains and fertile plains, all render its story attractive in the extreme. When visited by the Rector of St. Paul's the power of the Sultan was still unbroken and a slave market was a bi-weekly occurrence in Morocco city.
The Lecture will be illustrated by over 70 Lantern views taken from original photographs of the Lecturer.
Admission will be 25 cents and 10 cents for children. The proceeds will be devoted towards meeting the expenses of the repairs to the Chnrch.



LIEUT. IVAN AWDE

Word was received on Monday by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Awde, of Hagersville, formerly of Walpole, that their son, Flight Lieut. Ivan Awde, had landed in Canada. This Wednesday they received a phone message from him from Toronto where he had but recently arrived, and the information was that he would get home on Thursday. It will be remembered that Lieut. Awde, who was in the aviation corps, was reported missing on September 1, 1918, and for many weeks no word or trace of him could be found. About the time of the Armistice, however, he was reported a prisoner-of-war in Germany. Owing to engine trouble he had been forced to descend behind the enemy lines, being badly wounded at the time in the hip. While in Germany he underwent a number of operations. Since his repatriation he has been convalescing in England. Besides his overjoyed parents, the many friends and relatives of the young hero will be pleased to know of his arrival home.

Anglican Forward Movement

On Sunday morning next at St. Paul's Church the Venerable Archdeacon Perry, M.A. will preach a special sermon with reference of the Anglican Forward Movement. The Archdeacon will also address a public meeting at the St. Paul's Schoolroom on Monday evening, Dec. 8th. Archdeacon Perry has been appointed by the Synod of Niagara, generally to further the interest interest in the Forward Movement and comes to Jarvis as the representative of the diocesan Synod. Both on Sunday and Monday he may be relied upon not only to explain clearly the aims both Spiritual and Material of the Forward Movement generally but also to emphasize in what way these aims and objects may be secured in a rural community. It is confidently expected that large congregations will welcome the Archdeacon on both these occasions.
