the outbreak be arrested at once.  
The attention of the Public is drawn  
to the Statute which makes it an offence  
to conceal the same.

Also that Vaccination is an effective  
prevention of Small Pox, and all who  
have not been vaccinated are urged to  
do so.  
Dr. Jacques has a supply of vaccine  
which is distributed free of charge.
