Caught in Trap Door

Charles Staunton, an English lad, about 35 years of age, met death very suddenly Saturday last. The young man was working for Mr. John F. Nelles, Oneida, was in the barn feeding the stock, and while in the hay mow throwing down hay it is supposed that he fell through the trap door, catching hold of the door while falling, pulling the door with him, which caught him around the neck strangling him to death, being dead when found. Coroner Forbes was notified, but after viewing the body and learning the cause of death, decided an inquest was not necessary. The young man worked for Mr. Nelles before going overseas to the war, being away four years, coming back to the farm again after he got his discharge. He has a brother living in Hamilton.—Caledonia Sachem.

Rink Opened

Mr. Robert Horn has opened up his south feed stable into a skating rink, it being opened for the first time on Monday evening. It will be remembered that Mr. Horn had a cement floor put in the building this summer, although it was not his intention of opening a rink with Hagersville building one of regulation size. However since the misfortune to the one at Hagersville Mr. Horn decided that a rink would pay, the flooding of the same being a very easy matter. Although not quite as large as the old rink it makes an excellent place for skating and should be well patronized. Mr. Horn is to be congratulated in providing a place of beneficial health and amusement.

Killed While Working

Lewi Matewa, an Italian, who lived with his brother in the old Mansion House on the south side of the river, was suddenly killed while shovelling stone dust in the G. T. R. yards on Monday afternoon. The contractors had a pile of dust stored in the station yards for finishing purposes, and it was while shovelling this into the wagon that the deceased met his death. The top of the pile was frozen, and Lewi was bending down and shovelling from underneath, when a large portion of the stone dust fell, striking him on the side of the head, breaking his neck. The pile being about four feet high. The accident was caused through no one's fault, and the Coroner decided an inquest unnecessary.—Caledonia Sachem.
