Wilson is minister of one of the largest churches in Hamilton. Mrs. Howard, one of Hamilton's leading soprano soloists, will assist the choir.

S. S. Entertainment

The annual Xmas entertainment of the Jarvis Methodist S. S. on Tuesday evening, Dec. 20th, took the form of a Pageant, representing the Rights of the Child. A little after eight o'clock the School marched on the platform and sang with the audience the familiar hymn "What a Friend we have in Jesus," followed by a prayer led by the Pastor. Mr. MacNeil, superintendent of the school, then gave a synopsis of the pageant to be presented.

Scene I. Religious education in the home. This was presided over by Miss Ellen Porter and 4 attendants, who represented the Spirit of Religious Education. A family was gathered around a table in the evening hour. The father with his paper, the mother with her sewing, the children, some at study, some at play.

Scene II. Evil Spirits in the home. Miss Lillian Henning represented the Arch Destroyer of homes, she, with her attendants, the Spirits of neglect, Temper, cruelty, selfishness and intolerance destroyed the home, upsetting things generally. Between scenes two and three a short and appropriate program of readings and music was put on.

Scene III—The Spirit of Religion in the Community. The characters were the Spirit of Religious Education and two heralds, a group of enslaved children, a group of Easter children, three wise men from the East, the spirits of child-welfare, education, supervised play, and of the City Beautiful and her train of Boy Scouts, Canadian girls in training, Canadian Standard Efficiency Test and Ep League of Christian Endeavor.

The group of enslaved children who had been released by the Wise Men and the spirits of child-welfare, education and supervised play, together with the Easter children, put on a drill, after which all sang the Corcoran and forming at the front of the platform, the audience joined them in the singing of the National Anthem.

The piano was presided over by Miss A. Jackson and the singing was led by Miss L. Henning. The entertainment was voted by all to be most interesting and helpful.
