Death of Mrs. Armstrong

After a brief illness from pneumonia passed away at her home in Mortlach, Sask. Mrs. Armstrong was only taken sick on Saturday and passed away on the Tuesday following. She had not been strong for some years and in her weakened condition was unable to combat the disease.

The late Mrs. Armstrong was well and favorably known here, having spent over a quarter of a century a few miles west of the village, and previous to moving to Saskatchewan, some three years ago, resided in the village here.

The remains were interred in the Jarvis English church cemetery on Sunday after-noon, the service being conducted by Rev. J. Hirst Ross.
