CALLED THEM "EUNS."

Kipling First to Recognized True Character of Germans.

An inquiry by a correspondent as to the reason for the exclusion of Rudyard Kipling's poem of "The Rowers" from the volume of his collected poems has not yet so far as the Boston Transcript has learned, been answered. This poem, which was a scathing arraignment of the Germans. was published in 1902 in the London Times in criticism of a sort of working arrangement which the British Government entered into with the German Government about ighthouses and other naval matters in the North Sea. So far as the Transcript has observed, this poem conains the first application of the term 'Hun" to the modern Germans, in precisely the same sense as that in which it is now employed. The phrase seems to have made so deep an impression that although the poem slumbered from 1902 to 1914, the word "Hun" sprang into instant and universal Anglo-Saxon use as soon as the war broke out. Rowers" had in it much of the lyric and expressive force of Kipling's earlier work — of "Tomlinson," and Mandalay": and why it should not have been included in volumes of his verse issued subsequently to 1902 the Nomad cannot say. It is a triffe cryptic in its symbolism. It represents soldiers of the Boer war in the form of galley-rowers returning from sea battles, and finding hemselves compelled by their commanders to row it, company with old enemies whom they despise.

They sang: "What reckoning do ye

keep.

And steer her by what star.

If we come unscathed through the Southern deep

To be wrecked on a Baltic bar?

Last night ye swore our voyage was done.
But seaward still we go:
And ye tell us now of a secret vow
Ye have made with an open foe:

That we must lie off a lightless coast
And haul and back and veer
At the will of the breed that have
wronged us most
For a year and a year and a year.

The dead they mocked are scarcely Our wounds are bleeding yet; And ye tell us now that our strength

To help them press for a debt! Neath all the flags of all mankind

That use upon the seas Was there no other fleet to find. That ye strike hands with these?

Of evil times that men should choose On evil fate to fall. What brooding judgment let ye loose To pick the worst of all; In sight of peace from the narrow seas,

The little German bargain had but a brief career, and it is probable that this diatribe had much to do with its going crosswise.

Raids for Arms.

Raids for arms continue in Ireland and some are reported daily. As a rule the Sinn Feiners meet with no resistance in commandeering whatever weapons are discoverable in a raided house. But occasionally the owners fight and the raiders suffer. An attack was made recently by six armed men with blackened faces on a woman's house at Fairbane. A retired army officer living in the house captured two of the raiders and drove the others away. The prisoners were committed for trial to the

In a case near Tulsk, in Roscommon, a party of men with blackened faces raided a farmer's house in search of arms. They demanded his gun, and when he refused, dragged him out and handled him roughly. He escaped into the house and finding his gun turned it against his as-

U-boat Wireless Aerials.

We hear of a gun bombarding Paris from 70 miles away and, though we need not be frightened. we may admire the scientific cieverness of an achievement like that. Not less marvellous is the way in which the German murder boats come up from the depths of the sea, talk 1,000 miles or so, disappear again.

For long-distance telegraph on land we use very tail masts, and the first submarine that carried wireless had telescopic masts not more than 30 feet high. Now, the latest German submarines carry small balloons for maising aerials to a height of 1.000 feet or more two thousands ssary. The wire is

wound round an electric motor drum which is instantly controlled by a switch, so that should a ship come into view the wire can be drawn in hatches closed, and the craft submerged. Outlined against the clouds. cleverly camouflaged, the balloons are almost invisible, but they enable the U-boat to send a wireless message to 1,000 or 2,000 miles and, under extremely favorable conditions, for 3,000 or 4,000 miles. It is horrible in time of war, but it is full of hope for peace. - The
