In Thrilling Aerial Duel

(Hamilton Spectator)

Some details of the air battle in which Flight Lieut. J. H. McNeaney, of this city, won the D.F.C. have reached here in letter recently received from flying men in France.

It appears that while McNeaney and another airman were on a scouting trip they encountered a squadron of ten Hun machines in battle with a lone, clumsy English double seater over the German line. In the course of the terrific fight that followed an aerial duel developed between McNeaney and the enemy leader, which was probably as thrilling a combat as has yet been reported.

"The Hun," says a letter, "was their commander and he sure could fly. He would charge nose-on at McNeaney's firing probably at the rate of 1,500 shots a minute and receiving McNeaney's equally hot fire in return. McNeaney never swerved, and when it seemed they must crash head-on, the Hun would duck, missing McNeaney's wheels by a foot. Both the Hun and McNeaney would then loop and return to their charging tactics. This performance was repeated several times. The end came when McNeaney drove slightly downward the instant the German ducked, and succeeded in having his wheels tear off the wings of the German machine as it passed under him. There was a cloud of splinters, and the Hun dropped, dead weight 4,000 feet.

"While this was going on, several other Germans were at McNeaney's sides like hornets, and later in the fight McNeaney himself went down 3,000 feet. His companions fortunately were reinforced, and having dropped three more Hun planes drove the others off and then returned to their drome, reporting McNeaney dead. Their surprise was beyond description when they were told that McNeaney had successfully maneuvered back, his machine riddled with bullets, having been struck at least thirty times, but he himself not even scratched.

Lieut. McNeaney is now in occupied Germany with the Royal Air force. Before going overseas he was connected with the Right House advertising department as artist.

Death of Wm. Glanfield

The sudden death of Mr. Wm. Glanfield, of this place, occurred on Tuesday, January 7, after an illness of only a few hours. Mr. Glanfield complained of not feeling well the day before and on Tuesday, although his condition was not considered serious, he passed away, the cause of his death being acute indigestion.

The late Mr. Glanfield was born at St. Austell, near Plymouth, England, in 1847. He came out to this country in 1870 where he has followed his trade as builder and contractor. On January 17, 1875, he was united in marriage to Isabella Treadwell of Walpole, and since then has continually resided in this place. He has been a member of the Masonic lodge, A. F. & A. M., for the past thirty years, by which organization he was honored and respected. He was a member of the Jarvis Methodist church and at the time of his death was on the local school board.

The funeral took place on Friday last with service at the Methodist church and interment in the adjoining cemetery. The last rites at the grave were performed according to the Masonic ritual.

The many floral tributes, which showed in what general respect the deceased was held, were from the following: the family, Masonic Lodge, Public School Board, Bank of Hamilton staff and Mrs. John Treadwell.
