## Returned From Overseas

A number of men from this vicinity have returned home during the past week, namely:

Bert Kindry, of Nanticoke, and Ivan Parkinson of Garnet, both of whom went overseas with the 114th Haldimand battalion. The two young men returned on Saturday evening, the former bringing with him a bride. Elsewhere in this issue will be found a reception given to Pte. Parkinson.

On Monday evening evening Pte. Wilson returned to his home in Rockford from England. Pte. Wilson was home on furlough last spring while recovering from wounds, but later was recalled to England.

Pte. Robert Gardiner returned to his family on Monday evening after an absence of nearly three years. He enlisted with the 110th Perth Battalion in March of 1916, going to France in March of the following year. In June of 1917 he was wounded but returned to France in October of the same year.

The adjourned meeting of the Council met in the Temperance Hall, Jan. 14, all members present, the Reeve in the Chair.

Pond-Walter—that R. Shaver and A. Miller be a committee to wait on Wm. Parkinson to consult with him on the fuel situation in Jarvis, carried.

Walter-Shaver—that the following accounts be paid.

Pond-Shaver—that this Council grant to the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto, the sum of five dollars, carried.

Miller-Walter—that Mr. Lewis Miller be appointed a member of the Board of Health, Carried.

Pond-Miller—that Misses Ann Smith and Shirley Holmes be appointed auditors for the year 1919, and that C. G. Allen be appointed Assessor, and Jas. Whitwell as Collector, at salaries the same as last year. And that this resolution be signed by the Reeve and that the seal of the Corporation be attached, giving it the force and effect of a by-law. Carried.

Pond-Walter—that the Clerk order 3 copies of the Municipal World and one copy of the Revised Municipal Act. Carried.

Shaver-Miller—that Messrs. Walter and Pond be a Road and Bridge Committee. Carried.

Walter-Pond—that Messrs. Miller and Shaver be a Committee to take charge of the boulevards, side-walks and street lights. Carried.

Walter-Miller—that Messrs. Shaver and Pond be a Property Committee. Carried.

Shaver-Pond—that we do now adjourn to meet again on the first Tuesday in February or at the call of the Reeve. Carried.

His many friends will be glad to know that he has almost entirely recovered and looks well and fit.

About 80 of the Garnet friends came to bid him welcome and express their great pleasure at his return. The evening was spent in conversation, games and music and a dainty lunch was served. The gathering dispersed after singing the Doxology.
