RAILROAD CATASTROPHE AT SIMCOE

On Thursday afternoon last while at his work as brakemen at the Woodstock station at Simcoe Mr. Ira Beemer had his foot caught between the rails and the crossing and was run over by the Port Rowan and Simcoe local. Mr. Beemer was shunting cars and in some way had his foot fastened, it being out off at the ankle, one of his arms also being terribly mangled. He was removed to the home of his mother-in-law where he passed away about an hour and a half after the accident, between four and five o'clock.

Mr. Beemer was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Orson Beemer, of Tyrrell, 13 concession, Townsend, and besides his parents, a brother and sister, is survived by his wife and two small children.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon last, interment taking place at the Simcoe cemetery, the last sad rites being taken by the Independent Order of Oddfellows, of which deceased was a member.

Sincere sympathy is universally felt by all to his bereaved family and relatives.

J. R. Meseccar Dies

Alone in the company's garage death overtook John R. Meseccar, Manager of the Comfort Soap Company, Toronto. With his face downward he was found on the floor by a party of workmen, and when a physician was summoned death was pronounced due to heart failure.

For more than twenty years Mr. Meseccar had been with the Comfort Soap Company. He was 66 years of age, and had been in fairly good health until recently.

Mr. Meseccar was a member of the Anglican Church, and is survived by his wife, one son, Bert R. Meseccar of Saskatchewan, and one daughter, Miss Maude, at home. The funeral took place on Tuesday from his late residence, 82 Dorval road, Toronto, to Prospect Cemetery.
