## Presentation Made

The presentation to the village's heroes  
was held in Chambers' Hall on Friday  
evening last, there being a fair attend-  
ance. The chair was occupied by Mr.  
G. L. Miller, who in a short appropriate  
speech opened the meeting. The Rev.  
Geo. Shields, who was a member of the  
114th Battalion, gave an interesting and  
instructive address of national remini-  
scences of the war. Dr. Wm. Jacques,  
M.P.P., followed Mr. Shield and his ad-  
dress was an eloquent appreciation of the  
services rendered by the local boys. At  
the close of his address Dr. Jacques made  
the presentations, stating that the gifts  
were not only to be considered in the ma-  
terial sense but rather as a slight token  
of the appreciation felt by the village to  
its sons for their services. The honored  
men made suitable reply for the gifts, es-  
pecially making mention of their appre-  
ciation to the Women's Institute and  
Red Cross Society for remembering them  
during the long years of the war. Al-  
though all of the men were not present,  
some being forced to be out of the village,  
and a few as not having returned from  
overseas, the gifts will be handed them  
on their arrival here.

At the close of the presentation the  
Reeve of the village, Mr. C. S. McCarter,  
tendered a vote of thanks to the Com-  
mittee who had the work in charge, for the  
efficient and capable manner in which  
they had handled their difficult task.  
The motion was seconded by Mr. J. Still  
Jones and carried unanimously. Mr. Ivan  
W. Holmes as chairman of the committee,  
made a suitable reply stating that the  
committee had spent many long and  
weary hours over the matter and had  
tried to use everyone as far as humanly  
possible, taking into consideration the  
length and position of their service.  
Suitable music was given by the Hair  
orchestra.
