The Elgin county councillors passed a resolution authorizing the clerk to prepare a by-law placing a closed season on grey squirrels for another three years. The most recent by-law expired this year, and the councillors decided to extend it.

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## County Council

(Continued from last week.)

### SECOND DAY.

CAYUGA, June 6, 1919.

All the members present.

Pyle-Sawle—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair, carried.

Stewart-Toohy—That, whereas, we have borrowed \$75,000 from the Union Bank of Dunnville at the rate of 6 per cent, and had not previously consulted with the Bank of Commerce in regard to the terms which could be obtained on needed loans for the year, and for the reason that the Bank of Commerce has formerly given to this county the most entire satisfaction, and has offered as all needed loans at 5 1/2 per cent. We deem it to be wise economy that the bylaw borrowing money from the Bank of Dunnville be rescinded and the money so far taken up be returned, and a bylaw passed borrowing \$75,000 from the Bank of Commerce.

McCarte-Hudspeth—That we accept the offer of the Union Bank of Canada to borrow by way of overdraft of our current account with the bank instead of by note, and the proper officers be authorized to sign an agreement for the same under the seal of the corporation, carried.

Pyle-Sawle—That this Council go into a Committee of the Whole with Mr. Clark in the chair, carried.

Hudspeth-McCarte—That the Committee of the Whole adjourn and we resume business with the Warden in the chair, carried.

Buckley-Holland—That the report of the Road and Bridge Committee be received and read, carried.

CAYUGA, June 6, 1919.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council.

Gentlemen—Your Road and Bridge Committee have made the trip of inspection to county bridges and would submit the following report:

1. Re the Oswego bridge. Would recommend that the piles be incased in cement butments 3 feet thick and 16 feet long, the top to be strengthened by some new stringers, and the top refaced 8 feet wide, Messrs. Runcey and Smithers to look after the same. The approaches of the bridge are to be filled to a level with the bridge, the contract for filling to be let to Mr. E. Dolan for the sum of \$300.

2. Re Loomis creek. Would recommend that the railing be repaired, the approach filled up and some new planks put on.

3. Re bridge on Wenworth line. Would recommend that the Road and Bridge Committee meet with the Committee from Wenworth as to repairs at a future date.

4. Re Caledonia bridge. Would recommend that the surface be refaced, rods tightened up and approach graded. It is also recommended that the Village of Caledonia be requested and authorized to metal the road covering the 100 foot approach at the county's expense.

5. Re Nelson bridge. Your committee made arrangements with Mr. Nelson to fill the embankments and build a small walk for the sum of \$10.

6. Re Schuyler bridge. Would recommend that one-half the cost of the railing, amounting to \$24, be paid to Mr. S. W. Winger.

7. Re Varenay bridge. Would recommend that Mr. Buckley make arrangements with the Reeve of Woodhouse, in Norfolk county, to have railings repaired.

8. Re Cayuga bridge. Would recommend that the rods be tightened and some new planks put on.
