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### Killed by Wabash

A fatal accident occurred on the Air-Line a few miles this side of Kenton on Saturday last when Robert Buck, formerly of this place, of the Simcoe section gang was instantly killed by the fast express. The gang, under foreman John Johnson, formerly of Jarvis, and composed of Charles Turner, Gordon Little and deceased, were going east on the hand-car, when No. 2 overtook them. The men jumped but Buck, it is said, ran along the track and was struck by the hand-car which was thrown by the engine. The train was stopped and the injured man rushed to this place but he expired before a physician could reach him.
