## Death of Luke Thompson

The subject of our sketch was born in the Township of Walpole, A.D. 1839. He was the second son of the late Joseph Thompson, one of the pioneer settlers of Walpole.

When about 21 years of age he removed to the County of Norfolk and engaged in the lumber business. He married Jane Hutchinson daughter of the late John Hutchinson of Walsingham, and left Norfolk about 1889 for Chatham where he was engaged as a carpenter and contractor up to about ten years ago when he took up his residence in Montgomery, Alabama, and had recently gone to Jacksonville, Florida, to spend the winter with his son and enjoyed good health up to within three days of his death, when he died suddenly with heart failure, March 20th, 1919.

Of five surviving brothers are, John of Alberta, Jesse, Port Dover, carpenter; George, Port Dover, Furniture and Undertaker; Samuel A., Clerk of the Township of Walpole; and Arthur R. of the Simcoe Steam Laundry.
