Parallel Case to That of McCullough

A remarkable parallel to the case of the escaped murderer, Frank McCullough, whose chances of evading the death penalty if not captured before the date set for the execution have been discussed, is cited by the correspondent of a Toronto paper.

In the early seventies a man named McDonald who had a farm in the township of Walpole, Haldimand county, was murdered by two highwaymen, John and James William Young, of Binbrook township and Ancaster township respectively, as he was returning from the market at Caledonia, the murderers attacking him with a cudgel and escaping with his money. A few days later they were arrested and tried at Cayuga. They were found guilty, and John Young, the elder, being an uncle of James Young, was sentenced to be hanged, while his nephew was sentenced to a life term. A few days before the date set for execution both prisoners broke jail, and were not captured till more than three months afterwards.

The question arose as to whether John Young could be executed if the date of execution was passed. Legal authorities decided that there was no law in Canada by which he could be executed. An appeal was made to England, and it was found that in a lone case in the annals of British criminal law a murderer had escaped the day set for his execution, was arrested, re-tried and executed. The principle of the law of England, it was said, was that no murderer could evade the law. Upon this precedent John Young was sent to the gallows.

However, the authorities in Toronto, taking cognizance of the legal difficulties that might arise on the point, have relieved McCullough for one month, the date of execution being set for June 2—Hamilton Spectator.
