Interment to be Held

The Record is informed that the body of the late Mrs. Henry Ivey will arrive on Friday next, via motor, from Toronto, for interment here.

The late Mrs. Ivey, who was in her 93rd year, died at her daughter's residence in West Toronto on December 26th last, but owing to the Flu epidemic and sickness in the immediate family, the body was placed in a vault in that city. A short burial service will be held on the date mentioned, weather permitting.

On Sunday morning next a memorial service will be held in the Methodist church here in reference to the above.

**Property Changes**

During the past past week real estate took the active part in the town's topics when a number of properties changed hands.

Mr. Jack Kindry has purchased Mr. V. C. Ward's, sr., property on Talbot street West and takes possession on the first of June. Mr. Ward will hold an auction sale on the 31st inst.

Mr. P. Armstrong has purchased the property of Mr. T. E. Morrow, next to post office. We understand Mr. Armstrong intends to tear down the barns at the rear of the lot.

Mr. Willis Hewson has purchased the house and lot on Peel street east occupied by Mr. D. Winger and owned by Mr. Church, formerly the property of A. Underhill.

The house and lot on the corner of Main and Peel streets, owned by Mrs. J. J. Moore and at present occupied by Mrs. A. Ross, has been sold to N. Rider.

**Fatal Wreck at Darling Road**

Owing to a breaking of a brake beam, No. 3 Wabash train, westbound, met with a serious accident about one and one half miles south of Cannfield, near Darling Road, at 10:30 a.m. on Thursday last. Three passenger and two baggage cars were badly smashed, the road was torn up for 100 yards, and the engine turned over. Engineer Fred Bechely and Fireman Amory Bellows were killed, and forty passengers were slightly injured. One man had his head badly cut, A baby, thrown through the window, was found on a heap of glass uninjured. Doctors and nurses were brought from Dunnville and Cayuga, and the injured were taken to Welland.

Engineer Bechely's body was the first to be taken from under the locomotive, Bellows' not being recovered until late that evening. Both victims had evidently been killed outright. The bodies were taken to St. Thomas late that evening.

Both men were married and leave some family.

The Hamilton derrick and the Fort Erie auxiliary and St. Thomas auxiliary were rushed to the scene of the accident as quickly as possible, and the wreckage cleared away. The tracks were opened for traffic late Thursday evening.

## Quarterly Meeting

The fourth quarterly meeting of the Official Board of the Jarvis and Garnet Methodist churches was held in the school room of the Methodist church here on Monday evening last.

Reports from the different departments showed everything to be in good condition, the Sunday School giving a membership of 314, including the Home department and Cradle Rollis.

The treasurer reported the funds in good shape and a small balance in the Treasury though the Superannation Fund was increased by \$55.00.

The Missionary offerings of the two churches amounted to \$1200.00, being raised as follows: the Sunday Schools contributed \$302.00, Young People's Societies \$41.00, W. M. S. and Mission Band \$344.00 and the congregations \$625.00 with a little more to come in yet.

The Board extended an unanimous invitation to the Pastor, Rev. H. L. Smith, to remain with them for the coming conference year. The elections resulted in Mr. A. Rodgers and Mr. Wm. Henning as delegates to the District Meeting with Mr. John Ivey as alternative. Mr. J. J. Parsons was chosen as delegate to the Laymen's Association which meets in Kitchener on May 28th in connection with the Hamilton Methodist conference.
