The new building will be 132x55 feet and three stories high. The tenders will close on May 31 and the building will be completed in three months. Liberal Organization

There was a fairly good attendance (including a number of ladies) at the Liberal Mass Meeting, in the Court House, on Tuesday evening, considering the bad state of the roads. The business of the evening was principally to reorganize, and elect delegates to the forthcoming conventions at Toronto, and Ottawa.

Haldimand County is one of the thirty-one constituencies embodied in the Western Ontario Liberal Association, and Mr. W. G. Charleton, of Aylmer, the Secretary of that organization, was present to explain its aims and objects, and to help along the work of getting things in fighting trim in this County. Mr. Charleton gave an interesting, though brief, talk, after his explanation of the objects of organization. The chair was occupied by Mr. J. W. Richardson, County President, who resigned the position at this meeting. It was a purely Liberal Convention, as a number of U. F. O. members, who are still Liberals at heart, would not accept office under the old banner, but will give his allegiance to the farmers' organization, irrespective of party politics.

Others present included Mr. R. F. Miller; Mr. J. J. Parsons, candidate for the Federal House, in the last election; Mr. D. Z. Gibson, candidate for the Provincial House and Mrs. Laws (Margery Mills). All spoke briefly, and they were listened to with much pleasure by everybody present.
