### Obituary

#### MRS. ANN HAMBLETON.

Mrs. Ann Hambleton who died on Friday last at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George Thompson, Port Dover, and interred in the Methodist cemetery on Sunday afternoon last was a native of Westmoreland County in the North of England being born there in 1828. She with other members of the family left their native home in 1848 and settled for a time in Pennsylvania, U.S.A. from which state they came to Canada four years later.

It was while a resident of the United States that she married Septimus Hambleton who, it is said, was a fireman on the first locomotive in operation.

When coming to Canada in 1852 they settled in Woodhouse where she resided continuously until 1898 since which time she has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Thompson.

Her maiden name was Ann Jaques, and was an aunt of Dr. Jaques of this village. Her husband pre-deceased her some thirty years.

Of a family of eight children see leaves to mourn here. Mrs. Thompson of Port Dover, Mrs. D. N. Almas, Hagersville, John of Toronto and Robert of Hagersville.

#### JAMES CULLEN

James Cullen, born in the County of Fifehire in the year 1843, died at his home in the village of Jarvis on Monday, May 26th, 1919.

Deceased came to Canada when a very young lad, spending his boyhood days and until a young man, at the home of the late William Bahe, in the Township of Walpole. He purchased the farm recently sold to William Doughty in the year 1866, and the following year was united in marriage to Christina Weir who predeceased him about fifteen years ago.

Though never a rugged man with his indefatigable efforts and constant attention to duty he built up one of the finest farms in the township of Walpole.

The deceased was well and favorably known throughout the township for his straightforward upright character and may be termed a true nation builder.

### Declined Call

At a meeting of St. Andrew's church congregation on Sunday night to discuss the call of Namoos church, Edmonton, to Rev. D. M. Buchanan the following resolution was unanimously passed:

"That the Session, Managers, members and adherents of the church, while greatly appreciating the good services of the Rev. D. M. Buchanan, would not stand in the way of his translation to the Namoos church, Edmonton, should he consider such for the advancement of his advance of his divine work and personal aims, but would greatly regret the loss of his valuable services, and that should he see fit to remain with them as their pastor that they will use their utmost endeavors to increase his annual stipend to \$1500.00.

Andrew King was appointed to attend the meeting of Presbytery in Moose Jaw, last and tender to that body the wishes of the congregation in the matter. Principal Grisham, of the Moose Jaw College appeared on behalf of the Namoos congregation and expressed himself as being in the peculiar position of having to plead for the removal from his presbytery of one whom he would see leave with great regret in his own heart, but he felt that the call was a true one to a larger field of labor. The resolution of St. Andrew's church, Kenlea, was then presented, after which the call was placed in Mr. Buchanan's hands for his decision. Mr. Buchanan spoke briefly, stating that he had never before been asked to decide in a similar manner in which so much doubt had arisen in his mind. He felt that the call from Namoos was strong, but he could not overlook the fact that during his seven years of ministry in Roleau he had formed ties that would be hard to break, and in view of the attitude taken by his own people in Roleau he had finally decided to decline the call. His decision was received by the presbytery with much enthusiasm, showing that he is held in the highest esteem by his fellow pastors.

NOTE—The foregoing was taken from the Roleau Enterprise, Sask., and the minister in question is well known in this district having been in charge of Knox Church here.
