**World News Items.**  
The following weird news item appeared in a leading New York paper and indicates why the Americans know so little of the affairs of Canada and the British Empire. The information is so misleading: "According to rumor, some time during the next six months Ireland will be declared a dominion, having for Governor-General Sir Thomas G. Shaughnessy, long identified as president of the Canadian Pacific, the largest transportation system in the world. In spite of his well-known connection with the British Empire, Sir Thomas was born in Milwaukee, Wis., on the 6th of October, 1863, where he spent his youth and received an American public school education. At the age of sixteen he entered the employment of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad, and from that time on he adopted railroading as his profession. Noted for his organizing ability in railroad work, he turned this same ability and his special ledge to good account in service for the British Government during the world war."

**A Message for Canada.**  
The Right Hon. David Lloyd George, Prime Minister of Great Britain, sent the following message to Sir Robert Borden, by the R34, the letter being mailed after the safe landing of the dirigible at Mineola: "Dear Sir Robert Borden: "Our airmen, who during the course of the war earned undying glory, are now adding to their laurels the record of wondrous achievements in time of peace. I am glad to have the opportunity of sending by them a message of cordial greeting to you, and to our kinsfolk in Canada. I need not say how much we in this country welcome every additional instrument for still further strengthening the bonds of sympathy and understanding between the Dominion of Canada and the Motherland, which have been forged in the heat of war. Ever sincerely,
