Reception to New Rector

On Thursday evening last an interesting gathering was held in St. Paul's Schoolroom when the congregation tendered a hearty welcome to Rev. G. R. Wreford, M. A., their new Rector and Mrs. Wreford. The ladies of the Women's Auxiliary had prepared an elaborate tea and a large number were present. After tea Doctor Lewis, the senior warden, in a felicitous speech expressed the hearty welcome which the congregation of St. Paul's desired to accord to Mr. and Mrs. Wreford, who, he said, had literally won the hearts of the people since coming amongst them. He welcomed, he said, with them that night the Rev. A. Hare and the Rev. H. Smith and he asked them to say a few words. Mr. Smith testified to the excellent understanding which had always existed in Jarvis between the clergy of the various denominations and said he heartily welcomed Mr. and Mrs. Wreford on behalf of the Methodist church members in that place. The Rev. Arthur Hare in an amusing speech declared himself half an Anglican, at least by ancestry and expressed his pleasure in being present that evening to welcome Mr. and Mrs. Wreford and wish them every success in their new work.
