Sixty years ago agriculture was the chief industry and industrial life was nowhere. As a result of the situation that there was more production than consumers in the world, or at least a greater equality between the two, prices were easy.

Take a glance at these:

**1908 PRICES**  
1 peck potatoes..... 4c  
1 large loaf bread..... 3c  
1 lb. tenderloin..... 3c  
1 doz. eggs..... 3c  
1 lb. butter..... 2c

Time has changed the situation. Farms has been deserted for the city life and industry has taken its toll of the tillers of the soil. Now see what the prices are.

**1918 PRICES**  
1 peck of potatoes..... 75c  
1 large loaf bread..... 22c  
1 lb. tenderloin..... 70c  
1 doz. eggs..... 50c  
1 lb. butter..... 50c

The above figures explain themselves and give the readers a glimpse of what constitutes the high cost of living, and how prices have inflated in that time. These articles of food could be produced by people themselves the same to-day as in 1908, and the prices go to prove that only a small percentage of the population are producers now to the number in olden days.
