Caught in a strong undertow while bathing in the river at Kenora, Robert H. Dobson, 26 years old, of 387 Kennedy st., Winnipeg, was drowned at noon Monday. The body was recovered within an hour of the drowning.

Dobson and J. Earl Morrow, a friend, were at Kenora on a week-end visit. They went bathing Monday morning and later got to a point in the river where a cross-current made a strong undertow. They were separated and Dobson sank beneath the surface. Morrow managed to make shore.

Dobson was secretary to S. G. Wark, of the Alberta Pacific Grain company and was a popular amateur musician. He frequently took active part in entertainments for soldiers convalescent at Tuxedo hospital.

TOWNSHIP PICNIC U.F.O.—U.F.W.O.

The Picnic and Presentation to the returned soldiers of the Township of Walpole was held at "Hickory Beach Park." Nanticoke on Thursday last and despite the postponement of the week previous was a decided success.

The proceedings opened at one-thirty with W. G. Clark, Reeve of Walpole presiding, and from then until 5 o'clock there was no lull in the program, with the exception of a few drops of rain just when Dr. Jaques was delivering the presentation address.

At the commencement the Jarvis Brass Band put on a half hour's concert program which brought forth favorable comment from band enthusiast, and Walter Edwards the famous comedian of Toronto and our popular fox producer of Fisherville, Chris Reichheld, kept the crowd in good humor with their witty stories and comic songs. The Nanticoke quartette composed of Mr. J. C. Hare, Mr. J. P. Long, Mrs. F. Lindsay and Miss Walker Walker upheld their former well-known reputation as entertainers and were much enjoyed.

Addresses suitable for the occasion were delivered during the day by Dr. Jaques, M.P.P., of Jarvis; F. R. Lalor, M.P., of Dunnville; Rev. G. T. Shields, of Innisburg; Capt. Lyons of Caledonia; Rev. A. W. Brand of Nanticoke; and Lt. Col. A. T. Thompson of Cayuga.

Col. Thompson briefly reviewed the 14th. Batt. from the time they were drafted in small lots from training camps in England for service at the front. He also gave a short review of his own personal experience on the firing line until he was forced from serious illness to go into the hospital where he underwent a serious operation from which he is not fully recovered.

He then dealt at some length with the after-the-war results and the reconstruction period, stating that Canada, the British Empire, in fact the whole world was facing a great, if not greater war than that which she has so recently passed through, but as he had placed every confidence in the great British Generals at the outbreak of hostilities in 1914 to bring success and victory to the Allied arms, so he would at the present time have full confidence in Canadian Statesmanship to successfully pilot us through the present abnormal times, and urged the people to give more earnest thought to the great economic problems that are now facing us. He spoke strongly of the wisdom at the present time of keeping away from class and social organizations which have a tendency to create unrest, and weaken the fighting strength of the nation, but rather to stand together as a unit as the Allied armies had stood together in France and Flanders, working not for class betterment or social distinction, but choose as their representatives men who were outstanding men no matter whether he be lawyer, Farmer, Mechanic or what profession so long as he was qualified to give to the people thorough and wise legislation which was needed as never before in the history of Canada.

A very unfortunate part of the proceedings was the fact that only a few of the watches arrived in time for presentation the result of a jewelry workers strike in Toronto, but the boys were all informed that their watches would be forwarded to them as soon as delivery could be had from the manufacturers.

The committee in charge have secured the names of 140 so far who served overseas but no doubt there will be some who have been inadvertently left off, and any person having knowledge of any soldier who served overseas from the Township of Walpole would confer a favor by sending word to the Secretary of the committee, S.
