New Map of Europe to Schools

Under the direction of the Minister of Education, 40,000 copies of the new map of Europe are now being distributed free among the schools of the Province. The edition is intended to supply the needs of the schools until the new Ontario school geography is ready in September, 1921.

The copies of the map for the Collegiate Institutes, high schools and continuation schools are being sent directly to the Principals. The copies for the public and separate schools are being sent to the Public School Inspectors of the Province for distribution throughout the schools of their respective inspectorates.

Jarvis, April 6, 1920

Pursuant to notice the Municipal Council of the Village of Jarvis met in Temperance Hall, all the members being present, with the Reeve presiding.

The minutes of last meeting were read and on motion of Holmes-Howell were adopted.

F. Ross presented an account of \$42.08 for cinders.

McNeill-Smith—That the account of F. Ross be accepted and paid. Carried.

Garbut Steel presented his resignation as assessor on account of ill health.

Smith-McNeil—That the resignation of G. Steele be accepted.—Carried.

Holmes-McNeil—That C. G. Allen be appointed assessor for 1920 and that the Seal of the Corporation be attached to the resolution to give it the full force and effect of a by-law. Carried.

George Blumenstock applied for a pool and billiard license of four tables in the village.

McNeill-Smith—That a license be granted to G. Blumenstock for a pool and billiard room for license year 1920-21. Carried.

McNeill-Holmes—That this Council expend the sum of \$600 on concrete sidewalk this year. Carried.

Smith-McNeil—That this Council do now adjourn till Tuesday, May 4, or at the call of the Reeve. Carried.

An Impressive Service

A deeply impressive service of a unique character took place at St. Paul's Anglican church on Good Friday evening, when an address was given by the rector, Rev. G. R. Wreford, M.A., illustrated by lantern views, entitled "From the Garden to the Throne." The Passion of the Lord was illustrated by a number of beautifully colored reproductions of the most famous pictures of ancient and modern art, and "the old, old story" was listened to with profound interest by the large congregation which completely filled the church. Miss Z. Rodgers presided at the organ and Mr. A. Hodgson also assisted with the violin.

Dates of Examinations

Timetables for High School and High School Entrance examinations have been announced by the Department of Education. The entrance examinations will be written by those pupils who have been recommended by their school principals, but are of the opinion that they can qualify.

The Junior high school entrance examinations will begin June 24 and end June 29. The students will be required to write papers in literature, art, spelling, elementary science, composition, English grammar, geography, arithmetic, Canadian history, book-keeping and writing, agriculture and manual training or household science.

Upper school examinations into the faculty of education will begin June 11. The honor and scholarship matriculation examinations will also be held on this date. Pass examinations will begin June 14. Those for middle school entrance into normal schools will commence June 21.

Lower school examinations will begin June 8. Those for entrance to Normal schools begin the following day. English and French model entrance examination papers will be written June 18.
