"Are the two-dollar weekly and the eight or ten dollar daily newspapers coming again in Canada? If the makers of newsprint have their way | Queen DeKol Irena 20220 they surely are. Steadily the advance in the cost of raw material, white paper, has been going on during the past few years. To-day to the weekly newspaper the price is about one hundred and twentyfive per cent. more than in pre-war days—and the end is not yet. Having depleted their own pulpwood forests, the United States are now forced to come to Canada for their newsprint, hence a greatly increased demand and a corresponding increase in price. Newspapers such as the Bulletin and those of other towns feel the change heavily, this not by any means being the only burden brought about by the new conditions. All other materials in the cost of producing a newspaper have made big jumps in price, while there has not been a corresponding increase in the revenue, advertising, the chief source of revenue, having moved up but a fraction of the percentage of the advance of material and labor. It is a serious situation. and already many papers have been forced out of the Canadian list and doubtless more will follow. The pressure is great, and to carry on means greater and more generous co-operation on the part of the Lyndenwood Queen 23501 public. Newspapers are not alone unto themselves. They are one of the greatest assets of any agressive community. They do more in the way of publicity than any other agency, and bring to their field a greater return than any institution consigned by W. E. Winger, Hagersville. therein. April-Hatched Chickens Made Good Fall Layers

A test at the Ohio Experiment Station to determine the best date Irene Butter Girl 35793 for hatching chicks, shows that for Leghorns April 20 or thereabouts is Queen Gano Beauty 2nd 40022 a satisfactory date in the latitude of Wooster. THE HISTORY OF BATTLEFORD

It is only of recent years, since the opening of the country by the railroads and the discovery of its wonderful possibilities, that Western Canada has found its way into the histories of the world. The stories of the early settlers who penetrated an almost unknown land full of hope but of uncertainty of the future, the Indian troubles, the proving of the fertility and productivity of Western soil, the transition of the prairie from its primitive wildness to the huge productive grain areas supplying the granaries of the world-all these are almost too near our own epoch to yet be history. Yet there are certain localities which constitute landmarks in the glowing story of Western progress, names already fragrant with historical aroma, blending the romance of early settlement with the bustle of modern industry and agricultural progress. The Battleford district is one of

The city of Battleford, beautifully situated where the Battle river and mighty Saskatchewan converse, was one of the earliest of Western settlements-a thriving little community in the era before the railroads. It linked up Winnipeg with Calgary and MacLeed on the main trail which led through what are now the prairie previnces. In 1878 it was made the seat of the North West Territories' Government and Parliament continued to meet there until the penetration of the Canadian Pacific Railway further south and the consequent attraction of settlers along its tracks caused it to relinquish this honor in favor of the more conveniently situated town of Regina. Its name occurs frequently in the tales of early western settlement and the Battleford district was the scene of many bloody encounters between pioneers and Indians. At the barricades of the town the Indian Chief Poundmaker surrendered to General Middleton on May 26th, 1885, virtually closing the chapter of Canada's

Indian wars. It is in this historic district, that one of the last blocks of land owned by the C.P.R. is just becoming available for settlement. It is a beautiful park area of picturesque shady groves, rolling upland and luxuriant meadows. The country is admirably suited to mixed farming and the live stock fadustry, for its rolling slopes produce fine hay, and its clumps of trees, whilst offering no serious obstacles to grain growing, afford shade in the summer and shelter in 'the winter. The seil is a rich chocolate coam with a clay sobsoil ensuring a conservation of these ingredients which make for rapid and hardy growth. Wheat is grown extensively and successfully as well as other cereal crops. Every phase of agriculture in fact, has been successfully carried on. Poultry raising. market gardening, and vegeta". grewing flourish, whilst there is no better dairying locality in the Western provinces.

Income Tax Return on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

Dominion of Canada



Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:-

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.

2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or

3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise. who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.


