The following is a summary of reports made by agricultural representatives to the Ontario Department of Agriculture:

The strong, keen winds prevailing during the latter part of the week have been somewhat trying to fall wheat, which is looking a little brown; but the roots of the plants are said to be strong, and a vigorous growth is expected with the first warm rain. Up to date there has been less heaving than usual of either fall wheat or clover. The latter crop is doing well where there was a good

Maple syrup is selling at from \$3 to \$4 a gallon. The run of sap so far has been comparatively light. Hay, owing to the scarcity of straw, keeps up in price, the price per ton from \$17.50 to \$19 a ton. Hogs are being marketed slowly at

from \$17.50 to \$10 a ton. Many cattle are selling in an unfinished condition, owing to the scarcity of grain and the high price of mill feeds. Young beef animals, however, are in good demand, vealers selling at from 12 to 17 cents a pound. Many dairy cows are coming in this season earlier than usual.

Horses range in value from \$120 to \$300, according to weight. Auction sales are frequent in many counties, and surprisingly high prices are being paid for machinery and live stock.

In the household borax is one of the most useful articles, and should always be kept handy. Particularly useful is it for keeping meat, fish or other perishables fresh for any length of time. Water is rendered softer for washing by having a small quantity of borax dissolved in it. Borax in the garden is a splendid agent. If dissoled in hot water in the proportion of one pennyworth to a pint of water, and allowed to cool, it will kill green flies on roses and plants, and when applied to apple trees suffering from blight proves most effective. Borax well sprinkled in the kitchen is also effective in banishing black beetles. For cleaning windows, mirrors and lamp glasses use borax instead of soda. Keeping Flowers With Sugar.

It is reported that two professors of a school of agriculture have made some interesting experiments in prolonging the lives of cut flowers. One hundred different flowers were used in the experiments, and it was found that sugar helped to keep most of them fresh, but positively injurious to lilies and sweet peas. It hastened the opening of roses and orchids, but did not affect tulips, daisies or crysanthe-

Experiments were made with small quantities of chloral, ether, glycerine, alcohol, limewater and ammonia salts, each of which served to lengthen the lives of various flowers. Some of the flowers kept in sugar and water lived four times as long as they ordinarily would.

The sugar does not have exactly equal effect on the different flowers it preserves. Carnations seem to like a 15 per cent. solution and roses do be or in a solution of from 8 to 10 per cent.
