July Rainfall was Very Heavy

The month of July witnessed an extremely heavy rainfall, it aggregated 6.34 inches for the month. Numerous and heavy downpours combined to produce this record. For July last year the rainfall for the entire month was less than an inch, being .070 inches.

The hottest day of the late month was on July 2., when the temperature reached 87 degrees. The minimum temperature of the month was 42, on the 27th. In July, 1919, the maximum temperature was 95 on the 2nd, and the minimum 46 on the 11th.

NORFOLK MAN MURDERED

Body Buried on His Farm—Lorne Helmer Under Arrest Charged With the Murder.

Simcoe, July 29—The body of James Learne, an aged resident of Walsingham, was discovered to day, buried in a fox-burrow on his own land. Learne, who was a man about 70, had been missing for about two weeks.

Dr. Mask, of Port Rowan, conducted a post-mortem, and Dr. McGillivray, of Simcoe, coroner, has impanelled a jury to hold an inquest on August 6 at Silver Hill.

Lorne Helmer, a 20-year old farmer and returned soldier, of Walsingham township, has been arrested and lodged in Simcoe jail charged with the murder. No attempt was made by Lorne Helmer to resist arrest, which was made by Constable Roy Marshall near Helmer's farm. The prisoner, who is of sturdy build, weighing over 160, and who was married some nine months ago, was first brought before J. S. Abel, justice of the peace of Walsingham township, who later sent him to Simcoe in the custody of Marshall, who made the arrest in the presence of Detective Miller. The prisoner served overseas in the 133rd Battalion, returning in 1918.

It is reported that the prisoner has confessed to the murder of the old man in an altercation.

The tragedy took place within a mile of the scene of the famous Shoup murder, three years ago, for which a man named Shelley was hanged.

Upper School and Honor Matriculation Exams

The Upper School Examination results were announced on Monday. The following is the list of candidates for the counties of Haldimand and Norfolk who passed on one or more parts, or who were successful in obtaining honor standing on one or more subjects of the honor matriculation examination, or both, as the case may be.

The part of the Upper School examination passed is first indicated after each name. The entry (Hon.) shows that the candidate passed the part with honors and the entry (Sup.) indicates that the candidate was successful in all but one paper of that part, and is permitted, under the regulations, to complete his examination by taking that supplementary paper at any subsequent examination and obtaining 60 per cent thereon.

Following thereafter is the honor standing obtained in each subject of the honor matriculation examination: I., indicating first-class honors; II., second-class honors, and III., third-class honors, respectively.
