The contract for the motor vehicle
license makers for 1921 has been let by

born Secretary of State for New York
State, Hon. Francis M. Hugo, originated
this hyphenated scheme. It was found
after exhaustive test, that numbers so
broken into groups of two were much
more readily and accurately seen and
remembered.

Fatal Motor Accident

As the result of the injuries he received
in a motor accident last Thursday night
on the Rainham Road, a mile west of
Selkirk, Arthur P. O'Leary, a Controller
of the city of Rochester, is dead. L. H.
Bernard, of Buffalo, and C. K. Wood, of
Philadelphia, who were also injured, are
now in Haldimand Soldiers' War Menor-
al Hospital at Dunnville.

The party was going east in a big tour-
ing car owned by L. G. Little, of the
City Hall staff, Buffalo, when the heavy
car broke down the sloping of the road
and skidded into the ditch. When being
righted into the road it struck a rough
spot, the steering pinion broke and the
car went over twice, the five occupants
being pinned underneath.

Dr. H. Schmeyer was the first to dis-
cover the accident, and called Dr. N. J.
Bicknell, of Selkirk. Mr. O'Leary sus-
tained fractures of the base of the brain
and also the portion of the brain over the
eye, with severe internal hemorrhage into
the brain. He died en route to the hos-
pital four hours after the accident without
having recovered consciousness. Bernard
has a broken collar bone, broken ribs and
is badly shocked. A splinter went thru
the lower part of the leg of Mr. Wood
and carried away a large portion of the
large bone. Little was shocked, but not
seriously, and Mr. G. Andrews, Buffalo,
escaped free of injury.

Red, White and Blue

paper. White marguerites and blue
cornflowers have sprung up among the
