While many commodities have started coming down in price the wholesale price of paper continues to advance. Newsprint, which is now over three times the price it was five years ago is to go up again, we understand, on January 1st next.

John Taylor of Dunnville is among the provincial police officers appointed by Attorney Raney. This is the first installment of the force to be built up for service throughout Ontario, one provincial officer to each county, under the directions of the local crown attorney.

Rev. R. F. Mercer of Nanticoke was to have preached in the Methodist church on Sunday, the occasion of "Evangelism and Social Service Anniversary," while the pastor, Rev. Mr. Smith was to go to Cayuga, but on account of the bad condition of the roads the exchange of pulpits was not made.

Lundy White a Simcoe workman, in the employ of the County of Norfolk, while engaged Saturday in a hopper car unloading broken stone, was seriously hurt when his car was rammed by shunting. White fell through the bottom of the hopper with a stream of stone and narrowly escaped instant death.

Last week Dunnville Chronicle headed an article "Jarvis Fair Busted." To us that sounds a little premature. It is true the society have no grounds but the society is not broke, other grounds can be secured, and no doubt will be. It seems to be just a question of a good live committee taking hold of it. Now is the time to get busy.

On Thursday evening, December 2, they will unveil in the Methodist church, Hagersville, a memorial tablet purchased by the High School Literary Society, in memory of those who paid the supreme sacrifice in the Great War. Capt. Lyon, of Caledonia, is to do the unveiling, and Mr. D. Z. Gibson has been asked to give an address.

Two more postage stamps will shortly be issued by the Post Office Department, one for 13 and one for 15 cents. Since our registration fee in Canada and to Great Britain and the United States and certain other countries it is 15 cents. This is the reason for the demand for the two new stamps. The 7 cent stamp, which is rarely used, will be withdrawn from circulation.

The wrecking crew from St. Thomas was called here last Wednesday evening owing to the derailment of two cars and engine in the Wabash yards. The engine was a new one for the I. C. R. R., and was an extra large three-wheel drive, of which there were three on the train. The accident was caused by a spreading rail and the track was torn up for a considerable distance. The wreckers had an all-night job. Traffic was not interfered with however as the accident occurred on the siding.

THE LATE MRS. FESS

Mother of Jacob Fess, of This Village. Who Died at Dunnville.

Mary, wife of Mr. Adam Fess, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Edward DeGursey, Dunnville, on Wednesday evening, Nov. 25th, aged 75 years.

Deceased was born in Albion, Ontario, Canada, and came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Schwager, to Canada when 9 years of age, settling at Fisherville, Bainham township. In 1865 she married Mr. Fess, and they resided at Nelles Corners. Eight years ago she suffered a stroke of paralysis, and she has been partially paralyzed ever since. Sixteen months ago she and her husband went to live in Dunnville. For over a year she has been confined to her bed.

Beside her husband she leaves eleven children—Mrs. Samuel Bowman of Hamilton; Mrs. Ida Stutz, Buffalo; Mrs. Henry Keifer, Hagersville; Mrs. Daniel Stark, Onondaga township; Mrs. Philip Knisley and Mrs. Wm. Knisley, Nelles Corners; Mrs. Ed. DeGursey, Dunnville; Jacob Fess, Jarvis; Fred Fess, Simcoe; George Fess, Nelles Corners, and John Fess, in Tourist, California. Three other children died years ago. She also has one sister, Mrs. Abe Ash, in Michigan. The remains were brought to Fisherville for interment, the funeral being held on Saturday, Rev. Mr. Eix officiating.

Increase in Erie Telephone Rates

The Ontario Railroad and Municipal Board has permitted the Erie Telephone Co. to increase its rates, as follows, effective with the bills sent out this month:

For party line, \$15, formerly \$12.
For individual residence, \$18, formerly \$15.

The 24 hour service will commence on Wednesday, Dec. 1st.

There is no increase in the extra rate for extension bells and desk phones.

Driver Walsh's Success

Geo. Walsh has returned to Simcoe and is setting up his winter stables. Mr. Walsh went out last spring with a string of six locally produced horses and put on a big season's work, often driving three races in a single afternoon. He started about 108 times, took first money 43 times and was out of the money only five times during the summer. He raced in Ontario, Michigan, New York State, Ohio and Pennsylvania, and has tabulated his winnings as follows: Alvin Merrill, 2,104; \$2,725; All Ablaze, 2,142; (sold in July), \$1,000; Theda Bars, 2,134; \$1,940; Sid H., 2,134; \$1,710; Hal H., 2,103; \$2,030; Ruth G., 2,094; \$2,205. Total, \$11,610.

According to threshing returns the general harvest throughout the Dominion is greater in volume than that of last year by 21 per cent. The yield of wheat '20 approximately 267,000,000 bus., of oats, 696,000,000 bushels; barley, 68,000,000 bushels. The corresponding figures in 1919 were as follows:—Wheat 188,000,000 bushels, oats 394,000,000, and barley 66,000,900 bushels.
