Jail Term for First Offence

The Provincial Government has issued instructions that the Ontario Temperance Act is to be administered in such a way as to prevent its violation. The Government pointed out that where a fine was imposed without imprisonment it amounted only to a license, and that a new amendment to the act authorized a prison sentence up to three months for first offence, and that magistrates in future would be required to impose this imprisonment in addition to the fine.

New Auto License Fees

The motor license plates for 1921 are being prepared for shipment throughout Ontario. They are a marked improvement over any previous markers issued by the Highways Department. The plates are of neat design, the lettering being embossed so that an observer standing at an angle may clearly decipher the numbers. Numbers of more than four figures are hyphenated as is done in New York and other States. For example license No. 152251 will appear 152-251.

The new automobile license prices are announced as follows—

The greater part of the auto-owning public will be affected most by the first change, which increases the fee on passenger cars of not more than 25 horse power, with not more than four cylinders, from \$10 to \$13; car of the same horse power with six cylinders, \$15, eight to twelve cylinders, \$20; cars of from 25 to 35 horsepower with four cylinders, \$15, which is the same as before; 25 to 35 horsepower, with six cylinders, \$20; eight to twelve cylinders, \$25; cars with 35 to 50 horsepower, four cylinders, \$20; six cylinders, \$30; eight to twelve cylinders, \$35; over fifty horsepower, four cylinders \$30; six cylinders, \$35; eight to twelve cylinders, \$40. Trailers which at present pay nothing will be charged from \$2 to \$5.
