### The Hastings Case

**Attorney-General Raney Promises Investigation.**

Toronto, Dec. 3.—Attorney-General Raney this afternoon promised a deputation from Dunnville, Ont., representing practically all the leading men in that town, that a formal investigation would be held in connection with charges against David Hastings, police magistrate of Dunnville, whose recent suspension by the attorney-general was based on the charges in question.

The deputation, which was comprised of indignant residents of Dunnville, strenuously expressed annoyance at what they regarded as Magistrate Hastings' hasty dismissal, but the attorney-general pointed out that the magistrate had merely been suspended and had been asked to confer with the department unless he wished to resign. Mr. Hastings had refused to do this, the attorney-general said.

Attorney-General Raney stated that the charges against Magistrate Hastings included allegations that his administration of the Ontario Temperance Act had not been satisfactory, he having erred on the side of leniency and that F. R. Lalor, M.P., dominated the administration of justice in Dunnville.

Mr. Lalor was a member of the delegation, and he at once denied this latter charge. However, the delegation appeared fairly well satisfied at the attorney-general's promise of an investigation. Magistrate Hastings was not with the party.

### Hastings Denies Charges

Dunnville, Dec. 5.—David Hastings, Police Magistrate of this town, who has been suspended by Attorney-General W. E. Raney, denies the charges made against him as related by the Attorney-General to a deputation from Dunnville, which waited on the Attorney-General in Toronto last Friday, and protested against the suspension or dismissal of Mr. Hastings. In a statement made here to-day, Mr. Hastings denied the charge that he had been influenced in any degree in his decisions in O. T. A. cases by F. R. Lalor, M.P.; denied that he had favored a political and whiskey ring; denied that he had been an active politician since his appointment as magistrate; denied that he had ever released without bail any person accused of a breach of the O. T. A.; or that he had ever refused to take information against a person charged with a breach of the O. T. A.

As to the alleged leniency of his sentences, Mr. Hastings stated that he had sought at all times to keep within the terms of the O. T. A. and all other statutes, and he had not imposed any prison sentences for first offenses because there had not been proof in any cases brought before him of actual sale.

F. R. Lalor, M.P., issued a denial of the charge mentioned by the Attorney-General that he had used any influence with Magistrate Hastings, and stated

that he had never spoken to him about any matter connected with the enforcement of the O. T. A.

### Holstein Wins Milk Test

Guelph, Dec. 6.—Marion DeKol, a ten-year-old Holstein, owned by J. G. Curtis, Ingersoll, Ont., was to-night adjudged milking champion in connection with the Winter Fair. Since Friday morning last she had given 267.4 pounds of milk, averaging 3.28 per cent. butter fat; and 9.11 per cent. solids. Another Holstein was second and an Ayrshire third. Twenty-eight animals were entered in the test.

### Music by Wireless

Mr. Roy Carter, who has been developing an amateur wireless station in Cayuga, has now added to his equipment a vacuum tube outfit, which has been hooked up to his wireless. Through this new connection one can hear the same as over a telephone. The Detroit news, each evening sends out a musical program, by placing a phonograph in front of their receiver, and the music can be heard quite distinctly, and also conversations, at the Cayuga station, which is in the rear of Mr. A. F. Carter's jewelry store.—Advocate.

## FORTUNES MADE WITHOUT EFFORT

Profits of Stockholders in Mail Order Houses Stagger the Imagination.

### CUSTOMERS SUPPLY CAPITAL

One Man Makes More Than \$250,000 on \$25,000 Investment In Nine Years—Hundreds Like Him.
