Old Residents Passing

MICHAEL WEDRICK

Michael Wedrick, a life-long resident of Haldimand county, passed away at the home of his son-in-law, Wesley E. Hodges, in Walpole on Thursday, Dec. 2nd. The funeral took place from Mr. Hodges' residence, to Nanticoke cemetery on Saturday, Dec. 4th.

Deceased was born in Haldimand county on December 29th, 1849. In 1872 he was united in marriage to Miss Eleanor Puritt of Port Dover, who predeceased him eleven years. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Hodges and Mrs. W. J. Saunders, and a brother, Joseph, all of Walpole township, and a sister, Mrs. J. H. Heath of Buffalo. In 1875 Mr. Wedrick took up the general store business in Nanticoke which he conducted for seventeen years, during which period he also held the position of postmaster. After giving up the store business he began farming and stockraising at Nanticoke, specializing successfully with Jersey cattle and percheron horses. On account of declining health he was, in 1916, compelled to give up his activities and took up his residence with his daughter with whom he lived until called by death on December 2nd.

Deceased was a consistent member of the Anglican Church, of a quiet disposition and much loved by all who knew him. He was greatly devoted to his family and his demise will be very keenly felt in the community.

ROBERT BUCKLEY

On Thursday, Dec. 2nd, one of the oldest citizens of Chesapeake passed away in the person of Mr. Robert Buckley, who had reached his 82nd year. Mr. Buckley was one of a large family, of which only one sister, Mrs. Mary Fannie McLain, of Portland, Oregon, survives. Of his family remaining there are his widow, sons Easley of Detroit, William of Kansas City, U.S., Lewis of Queenston, Oliver in New Ontario, and Nathan at home; daughters, Mrs. W. Wilson, of St. Thomas, Mrs. O. Grindell, of Selkirk, and Mrs. H. Lindsay. The funeral was held on Sunday, Dec. 4th, conducted by Rev. Mr. Mercer, interment in Chesapeake Methodist cemetery.

MRS. CAROLINE GEE

One of the oldest residents of Selkirk passed away on December 1st, in the person of Mrs. Caroline Gee. She was the widow of Jonathan Gee and survived her husband fourteen years and had reached the ripe old age of nearly 94 years. She leaves one son, Byron, of Selkirk, and three daughters, Mrs. S. H. Sternaman, Cayuga, Mrs. M. J. Kellam, Calgary, and Miss Rosamond at home. Mrs. Gee was the last member of the family of the late James Stewart, of Hainham Centre, and had lived in this locality all her life and leaves a large circle of friends who will miss her unfailing cheerfulness and good nature. The funeral which took place from her late residence was conducted by Mr. Siple, of the Baptist congregation, and was assisted by Mr. Wettlaufer, of the Evangelical church.

FRANCIS J. RAMSEY

Dunville, Dec. 10.—One of Dunville's best known and most influential citizens, Francis J. Ramsey, passed away suddenly this evening of heart failure, aged 70 years. He has conducted a large dry goods business here for fifty years, was prominent in municipal affairs, having been for many years a councillor, and later reeve and county councillor and was also the town's first mayor. He was also prominent in politics, being president of the Haldimand County Liberal Conservative Association and at various times offered the nomination for parliamentary honors. He was chairman of the Board of Education and a past warden of St. Paul's Anglican Church. An enthusiast

law lawyer, he was the vice-president of the International Lawn Bowling Association. Mrs. Ramsey predeceased him in May of last year.

He leaves a family of four: Guy L. Ramsey, of Sault Ste. Marie; Ralph Ramsey, of Guelph; Beatrice, wife of Mr. John A. Fraser, treasurer of the Dominion Security Co., of Toronto, and Miss Madeline, at home. F. R. Lator, M.P., is a nephew. Deceased was a prominent Mason and commanded the confidence and esteem and respect of the town and county in which he spent his life.

JAMES GIBSON

One of Oneida Township's oldest residents, James Gibson, passed away in his eighty-fourth year at his late residence in Caledonia on Friday, Dec. 10th after a lingering illness. He was in fairly good health until the last three weeks, when his trouble, hardening of the arteries, hastened his death.

He was of Scotch parentage and was born in Toronto Township in 1837. His mother, a widow with her family of growing boys and girls, heard of brighter prospects in Oneida and moved there about seventy years ago, when the Township was still in its pioneer state. He, with his brothers, spent his early days lumbering and clearing the land until he settled at Willow Grove and became a successful farmer, moving to Caledonia five years ago. In January, 1870, he married Jennie Lewis, the only child of the late Robert Lewis. Ten children were born. Emily, Lewis and James predeceased him. Those left to mourn his death are his widow, and David Z., William S., Mrs. James Creighton, of Oneida; Mrs. Lewis McClung, of Caledonia; Mrs. D. E. Martin, Hagersville; Mrs. W. A. McNiven, Ryckman's Corners; Mabel, of Toronto. He is survived by an elder brother, David Z., of Brantford, and a younger, Sir John, of Hamilton.

He was a member of the Caledonia Presbyterian church and in politics a life-long Liberal. The respect and esteem with which he was held was shown by the large attendance at the funeral on Sunday last.

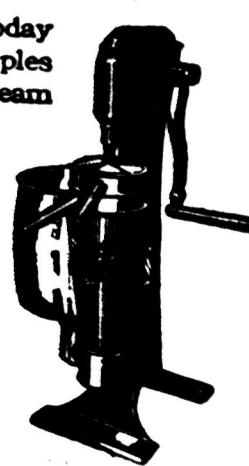
