

**Shooting At Break**

Dr. E. J. Whitworth, Hagersville, was  
shot last Thursday night by two men  
bandits, who had asked for powder for  
their car, and died on Saturday. Dr.  
Whitworth was alone at Lefkowitz's  
general store when the men called. He  
filled the tank and the men indicated  
him a bill, when he re-entered the store  
the men followed him. As soon as the  
cash register was opened Whitworth  
was attacked, and in the struggle a  
revolver shot was poured into him.  
The bandits then climbed the till of  
\$50, jumped into a car and disappeared.  
No trace of the bandits has been found.  
The motor car used by the two men was  
located at Mohawk Park, Brantford. It  
had been stolen outside of the Y.M.C.A.  
in Hamilton on Thursday night and was  
the property of Dr. Harold Thompson.  
Two empty revolver cartridges were  
found in the car. Before he died Dr.  
Whitworth described his assailants as  
foreigners, of 20 or 22 years of age.

**Error Lost Cup**

"The Cup," which Sir Thomas Lip-  
ton failed to take back to Britain,  
would never have crossed the Atlan-  
tic but for a foolish mistake. The  
America went over in 1851 to take  
part in the races in the Solent. This  
event prompted the Royal Yacht  
Squadron to offer a cup for a race  
round the Isle of Wight.

There were 18 entrants and 15  
completed, but there was considerable  
vagueness as to the course. Some  
competitors went outside the Nash  
lightship; others simply went round  
the island, which shortened the  
course by three miles—and the Amer-  
ica was one whose instructions allowed  
it to take the short course. This  
resulted in the cup crossing the At-  
lantic, and its remaining there un-  
challenged from August, 1851 to  
1870.

**Flogging for Profane**

The Minister of Justice has intro-  
duced in the National Assembly a  
Bill providing corporal  
punishment as a penalty for profane-  
teering. Only men are liable to such  
punishment, and not more than 25  
whips are allowed. The new law,  
if adopted, will remain in force for a  
year only, and will then automatically  
lapse. It wouldn't do to have such  
a law in Great Britain, or we  
should miss many of our M.P.'s, for  
quite a number of them are interest-  
ed in large profits and quick returns.  
If they were not, they would take  
care to look on economy in Govern-  
ment departments the way in which  
is chiefly responsible for the ever-in-  
creasing price of the necessities of  
life.—Spice Magazine.
