Death of Wm. Mowat

Mr. Wm. Mowat committed suicide on Monday morning of last week by hanging himself in the barn of his brother-in-law, Mr. Chris. Cronk, of Cheapside. Mr. Mowat formerly owned a farm in Rainham at the Lake Shore, south of Sweet's Corners, where he was well and favorably known. He was considered one of the best farmers in the township and leaves a host of friends who are stunned by this event. Mr. Mowat served for many years upon the municipal council in Rainham and was counted one of its most valued members. He was a staunch Liberal. He sold his farm a few years ago to his nephew, Alex Mowat, and had been making his home with the Mowat Bros., west of Selkirk, when one of the boys was overseas, and since his return he divided his time with the boys and with his brother in law, Mr. Cronk. Mr. Mowat was about 63 years of age, in good circumstances and no reason can be assigned for the rash act other than temporary insanity. He leaves a sister, Mrs. C. Cronk, a brother, Alex., teacher at Peterboro, and had a brother, James, who predeceased him some six years ago.
