

ANIMALS ARE CURIOUS
MONKEYS ARE FAMOUS FOR THIS TRAIT.

Many Domestic Creatures Also Display Considerable Curiosity Regarding Things That They Do Not Understand, While Crows and Parrots Are the Worst Offenders Among Birds.

If anybody should ask you which animal you consider has the most curiosity, your first impulse would be to say the monkey, and, of course, it really is; but there are many wild and domestic animals having exceptional development of their curiosity bumps.

For instance, there is the racoon, which has a "nose for news" that would do credit to any sleuth. Nothing escapes its searching eyes, nose or hand-like feet which it takes delight in poking into everything. Being by nature a night roving animal, the racoon has a highly developed sense of smell that enables it to ferret out anything you may happen to have in your pockets, and though it may have no real use for the article it speedily utilizes it as a toy. The racoon is very fond of eggs, and to see the quizzical look on its face when a china egg is substituted for the real thing is quite amusing. However, it is a persistent brute and will toy with the fake egg for an indefinite time to satisfy its curiosity.

Squirrels also have much curiosity. This is easily shown by the readiness of those in the park to investigate anything you may hold in your hand. Many of them will ransack your pockets and even search down the coat collar to satisfy their curiosity, while some are even venturesome enough to examine the contents of sacks thrown into the refuse can, probably in the hope that a good peanut has been left in it.

It is the curiosity of the goat that leads it to do many of its stunts, such as eating newspapers and other equally ridiculous things. Some zoologists claim that this animal has more curiosity than any other, possibly the monkey or roe, and for that reason it is very difficult to drive goats in a herd. They persist in breaking ranks, and if not noticed will calmly walk into any house along the road, roam through all the rooms, even going up to the second or third story to examine the different things that excite their curiosity.

Artists who have sketched out in the open have had great opportunity to observe the curiosity of cows. After he gets his easel and canvas set the cows continue grazing as before, but gradually draw nearer and nearer the strange objects they want to investigate. Probably the artist becomes much interested in his work and does not notice that the cows have soon formed a circle around him, stretching out their necks in an effort to solve the mystery. They may be driven away, but from time to time they return and repeat the same manoeuvre. Comic artists have taken this fact and treated it in various humorous ways, yet it is nevertheless quite true, as many landscape painters can testify. Other live stock is subject to the same element of curiosity, though horses usually vent their curiosity in a different way. Occasionally they will approach the painter, and then, with a quick whirl, they are off for another run, kicking their heels high in the air.

The curiosity of the dog is pronounced if observed for a few minutes. It is quick to notice a strange dog or person and the value of the watchdog comes from the fact that it wants to investigate every newcomer. It is very interesting to watch a dog when it meets a beetle. At first he seems to be a little afraid of the tiny creature, but finally he can't resist any longer, so he plucks up enough courage to touch it with his paw. Then realizing that it has not hurt him he smells it and roars it over and over with his nose. Then after he has satisfied his curiosity he walks away and leaves the beetle to go its way if he has not put it out of the investigation.

Little boys of the Orient often capture lizards by catering to their curiosity. When one of them spies a lizard that has scurried into a crevice he makes a slipknot of colored straw and holds it before the hole. After a time he is rewarded by seeing the tiny creature coming out to examine the curious thing before its den and later it actually puts its head into the noose, which is quickly drawn together by the watchful boy.

Fish and frogs are equally curious to examine the many bright lures that the fishermen know will attract their attention. In frog hunting all that is necessary is a rig composed of several hooks grouped together and covered with a small bit of red flannel. When the frog sees this bit of bright red it leaps for it and often hooks itself at the first attempt. Trout, muscalunge and other game fish will often leap clear of the water to grab an especially brilliant lure.

It may be said that every kind of bird is bringing over with curiosity as hunters of every land have trapped them by inducing them to approach and investigate unfamiliar objects. Crows and parrots possess this curiosity in extreme degree, and if anything is held near their cages they are quick to come over and examine it from every angle.

Pimento Is Dried Fruit.
Pimento, sometimes called allspice of Jamaica pepper, is the dried fruit of a small West Indian tree. The fruit is green when gathered, and turns brown when dried. The name allspice was given to it because it was supposed to resemble in flavor a mixture of cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves.

The Strong Man of Mexico

GEN. ALVARO OBRERON, "the strong man of Mexico," has announced that he will be a candidate for the Presidency of Mexico in the elections set for July, 1920. In his manifesto he says that if elected he will accord fair treatment to all classes and will give facilities for capital which seeks investment in Mexico.

Also he pledges complete recognition of all rights in Mexico acquired by foreigners legitimately and guarantees them all the prerogatives which the Mexican laws permit. Moreover, he says he is going to reform Mexico's international relations and establish them on the basis "previously existing."

Obreron is the man who whipped Villa, scattered Pancho's army and made it possible for Carranza to establish a government in Mexico City. In that fight, which occurred at Leon, a piece of shrapnel tore away Gen. Obreron's arm below the elbow.

A fine looking, upstanding man is Alvaro Obreron. Six feet tall and weighing 180 pounds, he is a person to attract attention wherever he goes, and among undersized Mexicans he is especially conspicuous. His black mustachios are upward pointing, and despite the Yaqui blood that flows in his veins he is light of complexion. Obreron, in short, is handsome.

In Sonora the Obrerons are a noble family, but they were no longer a rich family when in 1910 Alvera, student and farmer thirty years old, acquired a small ranch which he named "Quinta Chilla," which freely translated means "In the last stage of bankruptcy."

When Madero rose against Porfirio Diaz, Obreron showed no special interest in the revolution. He just continued to devote himself to his crops and a small machine shop. But when Orozco with bands of looters passed through Sonora, laying waste to the peaceful agricultural community, Obreron swung himself across the back of his strongest, fastest horse and "took the field." At his own expense Obreron collected and armed about 400 volunteers, mostly Indians located in his neighborhood. It was an effective force opposed to the scattered bands of bullies who hailed Orozco as their chief, and it wasn't long before Sonora was almost peaceful.

Then Obreron withdrew once more to his small estate and thought himself through with military life forever. While he was visiting Hermosillo the news came of the murder of President Madero and Huerta's coup in seizing control of the government. This treacherous act inflamed Obreron and he became one of the parties to the now famous Plan of Guadalupe, where the rebels against Huerta's provisional government gave the name Constitutionalists.

Obreron and Carranza met there, and Carranza thought well of the young colonel.

In that year, 1913, Obreron made himself a real military man. He was opposed by Gen. Ojeda, one of the most efficient fighters on the Federal side. Ojeda, outnumbered in a hostile country and shut off from supplies, kept the Constitutionalists forces in their saddles almost steadily. It was nearly all work for cavalry, but Ojeda had infantry and artillery as well. He fought Indian style and according to the books, and in trying to outguess him Obreron developed amazing ability as a strategist. It was a practical West Point education.

Francisco Villa, heading the Constitutionalists forces in Chihuahua, represented a big share of Gen. Carranza's strength, and eventually Villa quarrelled with the Constitutional chief. It was not an open break, but Carranza decided he could not trust Villa to lead an army into Mexico City, and that was why Obreron was given command of the western army of the Constitutionalists, with instructions to take Mexico City.

That western army didn't exist. Carranza simply appointed Obreron commander, and then it was up to Obreron to raise the army. He did this, using his band of Indians as a nucleus, and recruiting it principally with deserters from Huerta's forces.

Finally, when his total force numbered close to 25,000 men, Obreron marched into Mexico City, driving Emiliano Zapata before him.

When the break came between Carranza and Villa, Obreron again took the field, and after several indecisive engagements scattered Villa's army, killing 3,000 of them and capturing about 500. Obreron's losses were about 500 men and his own right arm.

But with Villa routed there was only one strong man in Mexico, and that was Obreron.

In 1916, when Gen. Pershing headed a punitive expedition into Mexico after Villa, Obreron, as Minister of War, came to the border and negotiated with Gen. Hugh Scott and Gen. Frederick Funston for the withdrawal of the American forces. At one time it was reported that he was preparing to attack Gen. Pershing's army.

Obreron's first wife died before he became a soldier. They had two children. Obreron married again shortly after his triumphant entry into Mexico City and the bride was considered one of the most beautiful women of the capital.

When Gen. Carranza was inaugurated as the first Constitutional President of Mexico, in 1917, Gen. Obreron resigned his post as Minister of War. He rode in the carriage beside Carranza in the inaugural procession.
