

# GERMAN ASSEMBLY CALLED TO CONSIDER ALLY DEMANDS

## Berlin Has Sent an Envoy to Paris to Formally Accept the Note

### Bernstorff Vastly Surprised to Know He Was a "Wanted" Man

Berlin Cable — Dr. Wilhelm Mayer, German Charge d'Affaires at Paris, has left Berlin for Paris. He has received formal instructions to accept the Allied note demanding extradition of persons accused of war crimes. The Government has summoned the chiefs of the various parties in the National Assembly to convene Saturday in order to discuss the question. Meanwhile, the despatch adds, the Government expects to be in possession of the exact text of the Allied notes, without which no decision can be taken, as the telegraph list received is practically uninterpretable, faulty transmission resulting in gross mispellings.

The German Government disapproves of the attitude of Baron Kurt von Lersner in his refusal to transmit the list to his Government, it was declared to-day by Foreign Minister Müller to M. De Marcilly, the French Charge d'Affaires here.

Baron von Lersner's precipitate procedure in leaving Paris after refusing to forward the list to the Government, "in a hole," while his action has not been officially condemned, the Cabinet statement, nevertheless, permits of the conclusion that both the Cabinet and the Foreign Office were embarrassed by his action, and therefore lost no time in releasing him from his post as head of the delegation.

Up to 10 o'clock this morning official quarters had no information as to who was in possession of the two documents. It is believed, however, that they will be handed over at Berlin by a representative of the Inter-Allied Commission. Dr. Wilhelm Mayer, the German Charge at Paris, who has been at Munich adjusting his personal affairs, was summoned back to Berlin last night in consequence of Baron von Lersner's refusal.

**SAY IT IS IMPOSSIBILITY.**

Berlin Cable — At the conclusion of tonight's Cabinet session a member of the Government informed the correspondent of the Associated Press that the Ministers were unanimous in declaring that surrender of the men demanded by the allies on an unofficial or any other extradition list was an utter physical impossibility.

The Cabinet meeting, which lasted several hours, was attended by Matthias Erzberger, the Vice-Premier, and Minister of Finance, whose appearance was his first at a meeting of the Ministry since he was shot in the shoulder in the recent attempt of a former cadet officer to assassinate him.

Rumors that a crisis was impending in the Government are declared by The Lokai Anzeiger to be groundless. The Cabinet members are in complete agreement on Germany's policy, the newspaper avers.

It is understood here that the direction of the German delegation in Paris has been taken over by the senior ranking German official there in the emergency created by the sudden resignation of Baron Kurt von Lersner upon his refusal to transmit the extradition list to the Berlin Government.

**CAN'T FIND THE LIST.**

The present whereabouts of the official extradition list and the accompanying covering note is a matter of speculation so far as the German Foreign Office is concerned. Baron von

although the erroneous transmission permits of the conclusion that Dr. Karl Heiterich, former Minister of Finance, and Max Warburg, the banker, are among those wanted, in addition to other prominent civilians. The name of Frederick von Ingenohl has not been previously reported in connection with any of the extradition demands. It is possible that General von Ingenohl, former Commander of the German High Seas Fleet, is meant. Admiral von Schroder has been charged with cruelty to children at Bruges, Belgium, during a period when he was in charge at that city.

Up to 10 o'clock this morning the attempt to arrest those persons demanded by the Allied powers, severe internal disorder will occur.

"The Government," it adds, "cannot enter upon such a struggle unless backed by its own convictions and a majority of the nation. There is no personal animosity toward the accused, but the method of dealing with them is purely a German affair."

**BERNSTORFF SURPRISED.**

One of the most surprised men in Berlin was Count von Bernstorff, former Ambassador to the United States, who, it is said, is desired by the Allies for his alleged connection with Bolo Pasha. The Count, despite his surprise, seemed to be mildly amused. He declared that he was afraid to face trial. He added that he was ready to go if wanted, and that he might even put the Allies in a quandary if they attempted to prosecute him.

**SOME OTHERS WANTED.**

Among others demanded by the Allies for extradition are Herr Auer, former Bavarian Minister of the Interior; Admiral von Müllers, former Chief of the Navy Cabinet; Herr von Rossig, a prominent manufacturer, and General von Morgen.

Something About the New President of France

As to the political temperament of Paul Deschanel, the new President of the French Republic, about which so many are wondering, it may be said he is a progressive conservative, or was before the war. Just where he stands now, is, of course, a matter for speculation. Clemenceau, the "tiger," was always an objector and largely a radical before the war, yet the great conflict and the responsibilities it imposed changed him in many of his beliefs, so that, like Lloyd George, of England, it would be difficult to place him just at this time.

Deschanel's conservatism was all ways of a sort that permitted of new ideas, and all reforms of recent years were accepted by him, even if they originated with the radicals. Separation of church and State, which disturbed other members of his party, was accepted and defended by him without hesitation. He has never been of the tribe which learn nothing and forget nothing.

Deschanel's birth in 1857, in Belgium instead of in his beloved France, was due, indeed, to the fact that his father, Emile Deschanel, being a Republican, opposed the coup d'état of Napoleon III and was exiled in 1841. The elder Deschanel held an honored place in the Third Republic and the son came naturally into politics. Entering the Chamber at 28, he was its Speaker at 41. At 43 he was a member of the French Academy, and as he aged very slowly the "young" stuck to him beyond his rights and beyond common practice.

**FIVE GREAT AIR ROUTES**

All British, With Egypt as the Key.

British Controller Tells of Progress.

A London cable: Five great British air routes were described last night by Major-General Sir Frederick Sykes, Controller-General of Civil Aviation, in an address to members of the Royal Geographical Society. Egypt was described as the key of these imperial airways, the first five of which are: 1. Egypt to India; 2. Cairo to the Cape; 3. India to Australia; 4. England to Egypt; 5. England to Canada.

Regarding the Cairo to the Cape route, Gen. Sykes states that there are fewer than forty-three prepared aerodromes along the line, with an average distance of only 124 miles between each. Even now there are twenty-four stations organized with supplies of petrol and oil.

Thanks to the co-operation of Holland, the route to Australia is practically complete, but, if necessary, by flying from Singapore to Christmas Island (in the Indian Ocean), and thence to Australia, an all-British route could be obtained, although it would involve two long stages of 810 and 849 miles, respectively. The next war, said Gen. Sykes, would, in all probability, open with a fight for the mastery of the air, which would be secured by attack and defence. He would enable a large reserve of airmen to be ready for possible wars, and hoped that before long the air forces of the Empire would be welded into one force co-ordinated by an imperial general staff. Great Britain, he added, must become the carrier of the world not only on the sea but in the air.

**BREEDERS OF JERSEY CATTLE**

Steps to Keep Out Tuberculosis.

Plans for a Publicity Campaign.

Toronto despatch: A lively debate incited by R. J. Fleming, Toronto, arose at the annual meeting of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club yesterday with regard to the matter of establishing tuberculosis-free accredited herds in Canada under the supervision of the Health of Animals Branch. The method of procedure in inspecting and treating herds of cattle submitted for test by the department was outlined by Dr. Hilton, of the Health of Animals Branch, who spoke in the absence of Dr. Torrance, head of the Branch. Mr. Fleming declared that the testing of the cattle and issuing of certificates of their soundness could be done as well as by a qualified veterinarian as by any inspector appointed by the Branch, and a lot cheaper. The regulations imposed by the Branch would be a hardship on the expense to breeders, he claimed, and the further a man kept from the red tape of the Branch, the better.

Other members of the Club spoke in favor of the accredited herd system and Dr. Milton defended the course adopted by the Branch, which, he said, was similar to that followed in the United States with marked success.
