This could be achieved if each municipality would appoint to the position of school attendance officer Mr. Chas. Bilger, Secretary of the Children's Aid Society. The duties would not be very onerous. Where an officer has power to prosecute, letters are usually effective.

The new School Attendance Act requires each township council to appoint one or more such officers for the township. This act became operative on January 1, 1920.

The total enrollment of pupils was 3720, with an average daily attendance of 2557. The percentage of attendance for the year was 69. In the urban schools there was an average enrollment of 49 per teacher and in rural schools 31 per teacher.

GRANTS

Legislative grants to rural schools in 1919 were as follows: Canboro \$280.39, North Cayuga \$302.80, S. Cayuga \$175.36, Onoda \$262.68, Moulton \$308.69, Seneca \$352.37, Rainham \$270.59, Sherbrooke \$127.79, Walpole \$1008.49. The special grants on salary were—Canboro \$222.81, North Cayuga \$163.87, South Cayuga \$97.75, Dunn \$169.68, Moulton \$368.00, Onoda \$103.50, Rainham \$145.19, Seneca \$572.13, Sherbrooke \$86.25, Walpole \$637.83. Total of general grants \$3710.78. Total of special grants on salary \$2286.93.

In addition to these there are special legislative grants as follows—Rural school libraries \$195.47, agriculture teachers \$110.00, school boards \$38.50, physical culture \$32.50, equipment and accommodations \$85.20.

County grants on equipment and accommodations were Canboro \$50.68, North Cayuga \$10.49, South Cayuga \$49.10, Dunn \$50.68, Moulton \$78.22, Onoda \$97.23, Rainham \$77.92, Seneca \$129.32, Sherbrooke \$25.63, Walpole \$129.32, Sherbrooke \$25.63.

Grants to fifth classes were Selkirk government grant 152.68, county grants 152.68.

Grants to continuation classes were government \$273.38, county 478.37.

In regard to the County grant to fifth classes and continuation school the regulations require the county to give the equivalent of the government grant in each case, while it may give more than the amount if it so desires. In 1919 the county council gave \$200 additional to Jarvis continuation school. In 1920 Jarvis and Jarvis two years high school work is undertaken and is done very successfully.

CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS

From the foregoing report it is apparent too great differences are to be found in the cost per pupil of the maintenance of schools. I believe it could be remedied greatly if we could have schools with larger attendance. One way of securing this would be by having Consolidated Schools. Pupils could there secure a more complete education by having the advantage of fifth class work taught efficiently in the home school. Greater interest would be secured through increased numbers in the class. A keen rivalry would be set up in the competition with class mates. More interest would be taken in games, and in physical education, and so developing a strong mind in a healthy body, thus securing a more liberal education.
