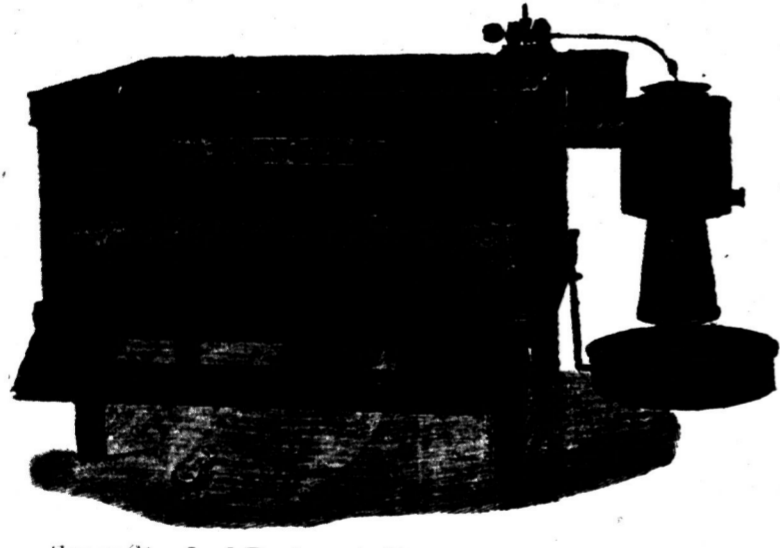

ed to include defects in highways in course of construction or repair, nor defects of which the municipality by its proper officers shall have no express notice, nor defects arising from weather conditions where no reasonable opportunity has been afforded to the municipality to execute permanent repairs, nor cases in which the person claiming damages has used the highway with the knowledge that it was out of repair.

2. That the law be further amended by a provision that in all cases where a rural municipality shall have closed a highway, and shall have given proper warning, and in all cases where the municipality shall have warned the public that the highway is out of repair, and that persons desiring to use the same shall do so at their own risk, no action shall be against the municipality.

3. That the law be further amended by a general provision that no action shall be against a municipality for damages upon a highway of the suit of persons driving or being driven upon a highway, at a greater speed than 10 miles per hour. Carried.

McCallum, Runciey—That a grant of \$1000 be made to the Law Association. Carried.

Doyle-Holland—That the report of the Good Roads Committee be received and read. Carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:

Gentlemen: We your Good Roads Committee, beg leave to report as follows:

1. That W. G. Clark has been appointed chairman.

2. The Superintendent submitted his annual report, covering expenditures during the period from January 1, 1919, to December 31, 1919:

Provincial County Roads Maintenance	7,647 00
County Roads Construct.	64,666 71
County Roads Mainten.	4,210 77
Total	243,660 73

3. That the Clerk be asked to write Mr. M. E. Crouch, Civil Engineer, Nipigon, Ont., informing him that if he becomes a resident of Haldimand the probability is he would be appointed County Engineer, as there is no resident engineer in the County at present.

4. That the communication from H. A. Hewitt be handed to the Superintendent to report next meeting.

5. That the Chairman and Superintendent attend the Ontario Good Roads Convention and Superintendent's Conference to be held in Toronto on March 1st to 5th.

6. That the Treasurer be authorized to continue the same arrangement with the superintendent emergency account during 1920 as formerly.

7. That the superintendent get quotations on white oak plank 11 ft. and 16 ft. in length and 3 in. thick and be authorized to purchase what may be required when receiving sanction of the Good Roads Committee.

That the estimates on Provincial County and County Roads for 1920 be as follows:

Road No. 18 from Village of York to Seuceta station, 2 miles	4,000 00
Co. Roads maintenance	6,000 00
	\$289,000 00

8. That we ask for tenders on the Cayuga-Dunnville highway known as road No. 1 and 16, also roads No. 1 and 18 as described above.

9. That the committee be authorized to contract for what stone will be required to build above mentioned roads.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Hudspeth-Pyle—That the by-law governing the members of the Municipal Association be amended so as to include Reeves and Deputy-Reeves of the different municipalities and that the bill be read a first time. Carried.

Houser-Buckley—That the Sheriff be authorized to purchase a pair of hand-cuffs and badge and deliver same to P. J. Haymes. Carried.

Berry-Foster—That this Council do now adjourn to meet March 18th (Thursday) or at the call of the Warden. Carried.
