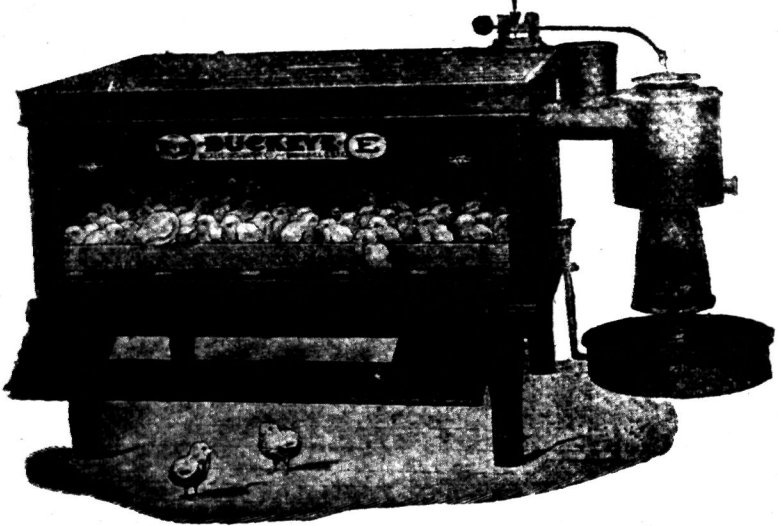

ARRIVED AT CAYUGA

No Criminal Cases and the Jury Was Not Required.

The Supreme Court opened at the Court House, Cayuga, at 1 p.m. on Monday, Feb. 9th, with Justice Middleton presiding. Sessions continuously during Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning. There were no criminal cases, and the grand jury had been notified not to attend. The docket consisted of three cases.

Kaufman v. Stewart, an action regarding a dispute over the sale of a cheese factory in Hagersville, was won by the defendant, the Judge dismissing the case in his favor with county court costs. Arrell & Arrell for plaintiff, and Kilmer, Irving & Davis, Toronto, for defendant.

Mendenbacher v. Hoover was an action for alleged alienation of his wife's affections by plaintiff against her parents. After endeavoring, without success, to have the parties reach an agreement, the Judge took the case from the jury, dismissing it without costs. R. S. Colter for the plaintiff, Bradford & Bradford for defendants.

Teft v. Diener Gas and Manufacturing Co., an action regarding the sale of some gas pipe, was settled out of court. In pursuance of settlement, judgment was entered for the plaintiff and terms of consent minutes filed. W. T. Robb for plaintiff, Bradford & Bradford for defendant.

Haldimand Women's Institutes.

In the recently issued report of the Women's Institutes of Ontario, the standing of Haldimand is well worthy of a special mention. The society was formed twenty years ago, the first branch being at Selkirk, the next branches were formed at Canfield and York, with others rapidly following until it now numbers twenty-five branches, the last one formed at Dunn in 1919 and proving very prosperous.

This County Society now stands first in the Province in membership (792), No. of meetings held (417), and total attendance (8,504). It comes second in number of papers and addresses delivered (317) and members fees (\$193.25).

The members are devoting themselves specially this year to community work, and child welfare. They hope to secure a "Children's Shelter for the County and purpose starting this campaign at the meeting to be held in Caldwonia in March.

Wabash to Lease G. T. R. Line for 21-Year Term

Agreement Has Been Prepared and Will Go Into Force March 1st—No Changes Are Made in Terms—No Provisions for Double Tracking.

A new 21-year agreement governing running rights of the Wabash Railroad over the Grand Trunk line from Windsor to the Niagara border has been prepared and, it is expected, will be put into effect by the lot of March.

A meeting, preliminary to the acceptance of the new agreement, was held in the office of J. C. Crombie, the divisional superintendent here, Thursday afternoon, and continued over until Friday afternoon. This meeting is wholly of Grand Trunk officials, they being present from Montreal, Toronto, Fort Erie, Windsor and other points.

The old agreement between the Wabash Railroad and Grand Trunk expired on January 1, 1919, but has remained in force until now. It is said that the new agreement will not make any substantial changes in the present agreement. Reports that the line will be double tracked and that large shops will be erected here under the revised terms are untrue, it is said.

It is quite probable that the Grand Trunk and Wabash heads will meet here later this month and finally accept the agreement.—St. Thomas Times.
