**A Lost People Are Found**

**B**EHIND many a laconic cable despatch of to-day which sounds dry and unpronounceable lies a background of vivid romance and human interest. How many people noticed these lines from an Associated Press despatch from Constantinople?

"The Leseghians, as these mountaineers are called, have already surrounded Petrovsk, in northern Daghestan, thereby cutting the railway from the Baku oil field to Rostov-on-the-Don, which passes through Petrovsk."

This remote Daghestan, "an island in the sea of history," suddenly emerges into world limelight in connection with Gen. Denikine's struggle for Russian supremacy. George Kennan supplies the geographic setting and local color for this piece of news, as follows:

"In the southeastern corner of European Russia, between the Black Sea and the Caspian, there rises abruptly from the dead level of the tatar steppes a huge, broken wall of snowy, alpine mountains, which has been known to the world for more than 2,000 years as the great range of the Caucasus.

"It is in some respects one of the most remarkable mountain passes in existence. Its peaks outrank those of Switzerland, both in height and in rugged grandeur of outline; its glaciers, ice-falls and avalanches are all upon the most gigantic scale; diversity of its climates is only paralleled by the diversity of the races that inhabit it, and its history, beginning with the Argonautic expedition, is more remarkable and eventful than that of any other range on the globe.

"No other region that I have ever seen presents, in an equally limited area, such diversities of climate, scenery and vegetation. On the northern side of the range lie the treeless, wandering grounds of the Nogai Tartars—limitable steppes, where for hundreds of miles the weary eye sees in summer only a parched waste of dry steppe grass, and in winter an ocean of snow, dotted here and there with the huts and the black tents of nomadic Mongols.

"But across the great range from north to south, and the whole face of nature is changed. From a boundless steppe you come suddenly into a series of shallow, fertile valleys, blossoming with flowers, green with vineyards, and festooned with blossoming vines, and in autumn the sunny hillside of Georgia, Kakhethia and Mingrelia are fairly purple with vineyards of ripening grapes.

"Climate here is only a question of altitude. In these semi-tropical valleys you may obtain in a few hours to the highest limit of vegetable life and eat your supper, if you feel so disposed, on the slow-moving ice of a glacier.

"The Caucasian range may be regarded for all ethnological purposes as a great mountainous island in the sea of human history, and on that island now live together the surviving Robinson Crusoes of a score of ship-wrecked states and nationalities—the fugitive mutineers of a hundred tribal Bounties.

"In Daghestan there are four or five thousand Jews, who, although they have lost their language and their national character, cling to their religion; and among the hills peaks of Tsoetseti, in the same province, is settled a community of Christians, said to be the descendants of a band of medieval Crusaders. But these are exceptions; nine-tenths of the mountaineers are Mohammedans of the bravest and dialectic type.

"The languages and dialects spoken by the different tribes of this heterogeneous population are more than thirty in number, and two-thirds of them are to be found in the Province of Daghestan, at the eastern end of the range, where the ethnological diversity of the population is most marked.

"Languages spoken by only 12 or 15 settlements are comparatively common and on the headwaters of the Andiski Kolu, in southwestern Daghestan, there is an isolated village of 50 or 60 houses—the aoul or In-nookh—which has a language of its own, not spoken or understood by any other party of the whole Caucasian population.

"Of course, the life, customs and social organizations of a people who originated in the way that I have described, and who lived for perhaps 2,000 years in almost complete isolation from all the rest of the world, presented when they first became known many strange and archaic features. In the secluded valleys and canyons of the eastern Caucasus it was possible to study a state of society that existed in England before the Norman conquest, and see in full operation customs and legal processes that had been obsolete everywhere else in Europe for at least a billion years.

"Many of the souls of central and southern Daghestan bear a striking resemblance to the pueblos and cliff-dwellings of New Mexico. The stone-walled houses are built together in a compact mass on the steep slope of a high terrace, and the flat roofs rise in tiers or steps, one above another, just as they do in the settlements of the Pueblo Indians. The roof of one house forms a small square front yard for the occupants of the house next above it, and ladders serve as means of inter-communication between the roofs of the ascending tiers."

**NEARLY UPSET CONFERENCE.**

**Phosphoric Isle of Nauru In Pacific Is Worth Millions.**

In an article contributed to the London Daily Mail, Thomas L. McMahon, F.R.C.S., gives what may be assumed to be an authentic account of what he calls "the little spot of earth that nearly upset the Peace Conference," a tiny island in the loneliest part of the Central Pacific.

This island, called Nauru, is, the writer adds, worth many millions of tons of phosphate-rock.

"A mere pinch of this magic tropical product put into the most impoverished soil has an amazing effect upon plant life. In Australia, where some 200,000 tons is used annually, it doubled the wheat crop.

"In Japan farming cannot now do without the aid of this fertilizer. Japanese farmers are keen buyers of the product. Indeed, every nation that farms extensively is placing orders for phosphate-rock.

"Nauru is only 12 miles in circumference, 5,000 acres in extent. It is 33 miles from the south of the Equator, 2,300 miles from New Zealand, 2,000 miles from Australia, 3,000 from Japan, and 4,700 miles from America. It is the Treasure Island Australia claims, New Zealand wants, and Japan demanded as part of the Marshalls, but to which Britain has established the most right.

"Before the war Nauru was German territory and attached to the German group of islands, the Marshalls. Under German administration the natives were cruelly neglected and their number dwindled to a mere 2,000. Under energetic and humane British administration the natives are one of the healthiest and most progressive races in the whole South Pacific. They have been weaned from their idle ways and encouraged to improve their villages, make and mend roads, and give up the inhuman practice of burying their dead in their houses or at the front or back doors.

"Hundreds of natives now work in the phosphate fields, are paid very high wages, and have the most comfortable living conditions.

"The native coconut plantations, neglected in the German time, are now cleared, improved, and profitable. The natives are renowned for their pleasant manners—one reason why the original name of the island was 'pleasant'."

**What Hair Indicates.**

According to folklore contributed from many parts of the globe, a heavy head of hair indicates little, if any, virtues, says Tit-Bits. The Turks claim that women with short intellect have long hair. The Albanians say with more finality, "Long hair, little brains." Other contributors declare that much hair indicates unchangeable temper and inclination to melancholy. "If a girl has a great deal of hair," according to another source, "she will marry poorly, while the girl with little hair will marry rich."

Next in bad grace with the folklore authorities is the enviable curly hair. "It's the sign of a good," says one. "If the hair falls in little curls at the back of the neck it means an early widowhood."

Quaint and amusing are some of the other character delineations which the hair prophets have set down. Kinky hair is a sign of a variable and hasty disposition, they say; while smooth, plain hair denotes that the owner is peace-loving and courteous.

A long and peaceful life is promised the owner of hair that grows low on the forehead and retreats up the head above the temples.

Coarse hair indicates humble birth and a coarse nature. Black, short and curly hair indicates uncertain temper, a tendency to alcohol, and an amorous nature.

The darker the hair the more powerful the physical organization. Chestnut or dark brown hair denotes fairness in dealings, generosity, absence of deceit, but unhappiness in domestic life. Thick, straight and glossy brown hair indicates a robust constitution, energy and eagerness in the pursuit of life; thick, coarse and wiry brown hair, great determination of character; curly brown hair, a weak character, but natural ingenuity and ability; whilst dark brown long and smooth hair indicates faithfulness in love, many children, good health, and much happiness.
