Death of Mrs. David Jones

On Monday, the 6th inst, the sacred remains of the late Mrs. David Jones were laid away in the family vault at St. Paul's Church cemetery, and was preceded by a service in the church of which she was a life member.

Mrs. Jones was born in Nelson Township, Halton County, some 83 years ago, and may be considered one of the oldest of Canadian settlers of this neighborhood.

Her maiden name was Elizabeth Sill. Her father, James Sill, was an educated man, acting as school teacher, Justice of the Peace, magistrate and conveyancer for a large section of country round about where the spot in which Jarvis is now built was literally forest. In those days the main source of revenue was taking tan bark to Simcoe.

Mrs. Jones, when a young girl, was sent out by her mother to try and get subscriptions for a church, and as a result the old building adjoining St. Paul's Church was erected and used for many years. Her father was the first Rector's Warden and the whole family were devoted church workers. She was a devoted member of the Women's Auxiliary of St. Paul's church and always took a great interest and gave a liberal support to all its undertakings.

Mrs. Jones was of a most lovable nature and will be greatly missed by a large circle of friends. She had a family of five children, four boys and one girl. The daughter, Victoria, died when three years old and Alfred about five years ago.

There remain James Sill of this village, John D. and Robert E. of New York City, also three nephews, Dr. Walter Langrill and Dr. Ashton Langrill of Hamilton, and Mr. Wm. Jones of Buffalo, and one niece, Mrs. Armitag of Toronto.

Mrs. Margaret Alward

Mrs. Margaret Alward, widow of the late Leonard J. Alward of Hagersville, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John Law, in Tillsonburg, on Tuesday evening, Dec. 22nd, in her eighty-second year.

She was born in Halton county, but her father, John Foster, moved to Haldimand county when she was a child, and it was there she spent the greater part of her long and useful life, residing in Hagersville nearly forty years. About eleven years ago she came to Tillsonburg to spend her declining years with her daughter. Four years ago she suffered a stroke, and since that time she has been an invalid.

Her husband, one son and one daughter predeceased her, and she is survived by two daughters, Mrs. John Law of Tillsonburg and Miss Jennie Alward, matron of the convalescent hospital, Winnipeg, and three sons, John and Stanley of Hagersville and James B. Alward of Hamilton, also one brother, John Foster of Hagersville.

The body was taken to Hagersville to be laid beside that of her husband. The funeral took place from the home of her son, Mr. Stacey Alward, Friday afternoon, the services being conducted by Rev. Mr. Douglas, rector of All Saints church.—Tillsonburg News.
