Library Annual Meeting

The Annual meeting of the Jarvis Public Library was held in the Library room on Monday evening, Jan. 19th, with a fair attendance of members present.

The President, J. A. Burwash, occupied the chair.

The minutes of last meeting were read and on motion of Rev. Mr. Smith, seconded by R. Walter, was declared, confirmed as read.

The Treasurer, Andrew Rodgers, presented his report, which showed receipts \$210.98, expenditures \$192.30, with a balance on hand of \$18.18. The Librarian's report showed:—Number of members 145, books issued 3235 volumes, gain both in members and books issued over the preceding year.

The election of Directors resulted as follows:—J. A. Burwash, Bruce Hare, I. W. Holmes, R. W. Smith, C. G. Allen, C. E. Bourne, James Williamson, Chas. McCarter.

The Directors elected the following officers:—J. A. Burwash, President; Bruce Hare, Vice Pres.; J. C. Santerson, Hon. Pres.; Andrew Rodgers, Treasurer; T. H. Lewis, Sec. tary; W. Machell, Librarian. The collectors for canvass for the Library are:—Bruce Hare and James Williamson. Book Com.—Messrs. Wm. Machell, Rev. Mr. Wreford, C. G. Allen, and Mesdames Noble and Carter. Hon. Directors—Revs. Smith, Wreford, Hare and Mr. James Noble.

The Rev. Mr. Smith and Andrew Rodgers were appointed a committee to wait upon the Village Council re the grant to the Library.

Mr. Richard Walter and I. W. Holmes were appointed to wait upon the Township Council to ask for some assistance in view of the service given to a large number of members from the country who belong to the Library.

This ended the business of the meeting and on motion of Andrew Rodgers, seconded by James William was adjourned.

Death of Mrs. A. E. Colman

On Tuesday the 13th of January, 1920, there passed away at the Hamilton Hospital, one of our loved and respected citizens in the person of Eliza Annie, beloved wife of Dr. A. R. Colman of this village. The funeral took place on Tuesday, the 20th of January from her late home here, to St. Paul's cemetery, where all that remained of deceased were laid to rest.

She and the doctor were married in 1870, and had lived till the 29th of next June, would have celebrated the golden anniversary of their wedding, truly a life of love and affection between them that ended only by death.

In 1876 they came and located in this village where the doctor has practised his profession of Veterinarian ever since. In that long period of forty three years deceased has lived a life beloved by all who knew her, and always had a smile and kind word for every one. Mrs. Colman took a very active part in her church work and social conditions in connection therewith as long as she was able to attend to them.

Five children were born to them, two boys and three girls, but death claimed three of them, the youngest girl Winifred, in 1893, the oldest boy, Walter, in 1913, and the next oldest girl, Amy, (Mrs. James R. Waddle) in 1914.

Mrs. Colman is survived by her husband, one son Dr. A. R. Colman, Jr., of Kindesty, Sask., and one daughter, Edith, (Mrs. Alex. Glassford), of Hamilton.

Death of Homer Johnson

Mr. Homer Johnson peacefully passed away at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Johnson, Waterford, on Monday, January 12th, 1920. Homer was in his 45th year and was born in Jarvis, Jan. 1870. He came to Waterford with his parents about 30 years ago.

About seven years ago his health failing him he went to California, where he consulted the best physicians but of no avail. He steadily became worse and last May returned home, where all that loving hands could do for him was done. Homer's cheerfulness of mind and the great patience with which he bore his sickness will not soon be forgotten by those who knew him. He appreciated so much the calls and kind words of Revs. Anderson and Wilkins. It being impossible for Mr. Anderson to be here, the Rev. Mr. Wilkins will conduct the funeral service at the home of his parents, College St., Thursday, Jan. 15 at 2 o'clock. Besides his sorrowing parents he leaves one sister, Mrs. C. E. The Council elect of the township of Walpole met in the village of Jarvis on Monday, January 12th pursuant to statute.

The following members elect were present, Reeve W. G. Clark, Deputy Reeve Norman Buckley; Councillors, Frank Laidlaw, W. B. Shoup and W. J. Saunders.

After subscribing to the Declaration of office and qualification Reeve W. G. Clark took the chair.

Burned to Death

Shortly before 11 o'clock Sunday morning the residence of L. G. Morgan was discovered to be on fire. Owing to the dense volume of smoke the fire was hard to locate, but was at last found to be in Mr. Morgan's bedroom, where there was an oil stove, which is supposed to have been the cause of the fire.

After the flames were subdued somewhat Mr. Morgan's body was found badly burned, and his remains were removed to another room in the house. Meanwhile his two sisters had been rescued with difficulty.

Mr. Morgan began his career as a public school teacher in Sand's school, near here, 55 years ago. Later he taught in the local high school. He had been editor and proprietor of the Maple Leaf for the past 38 years, retiring from active life last September.

It was generally conceded that Mr. Morgan was one of the best masters of English in Canada.

In addition to the sisters mentioned, one brother, Cosbie survives. Deceased was in his 73rd year. He was an Anglican and a Mason.

Considering the nature of the fire and the start it had, the chemical hand fire engine rendered excellent service. The actual fire damage is limited to the total destruction of the wardrobe and contents of Mr. Morgan's bedroom, but that by smoke and water was considerable.
