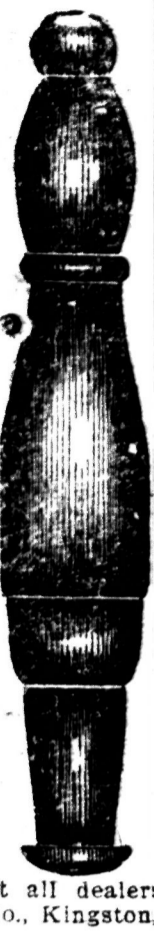

42 KILLED IN RIOT IN BERLIN

Troops Were Forced to Make Use of Bombs.

Woske Takes Stern Measures for Order.

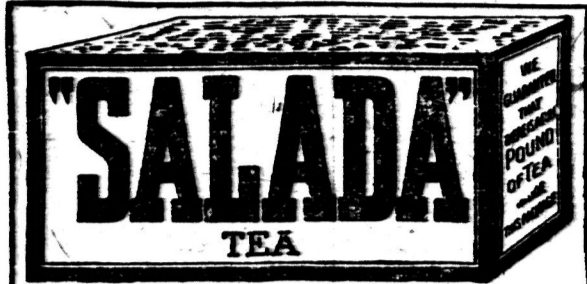
Berlin Cable — It is semi-officially announced, and seems to be finally established, that 42 persons were killed and 195 wounded in the Reichstag fighting.

Minister of Defence Woske has prohibited the sale of Die Freiheit and Red Flag throughout the territory where a state of siege has been proclaimed. Street parades, meetings and demonstrations of all kinds have been prohibited.

The Social Democratic party has issued an appeal to its members not to allow themselves to be provoked by independent and Communist wire-pullers who are directly responsible for the bloodshed and want to continue playing an unscrupulous game with human lives.

The appeal asks whether the workers will permit national representation to be placed under terrorism, and tells them that the German nation can be saved from complete destruction only by work.

All the royalist papers also support the Government and welcome the proclamation of martial law. Chancellor Bauer said: "I regard it my duty to express in the name of the Government my thanks to the safety police. Signals were given to storm the Reichstag building by the independentists waving their independence flags. Had the mob succeeded in penetrating the building, a second Bartholomew's night would have ensued."

THE BRITISH RAIL TROUBLE

Cabinet Reply to Refusal of the Men.

Railwaymen's Conduct is Given Rap.

London Cable — The Government's reply to the National Union of Railwaymen with regard to the union's protest against the recent proposals of the Government, was submitted this afternoon. The executive committee, after a deliberation and having arrived at no decision, adjourned until to-morrow.

The executive committee of the Union of Railwaymen, throughout the present railway dispute, has preserved what is considered a rather unwelcome secrecy in the progress of the negotiations, secrecy which has provoked adverse comment as inconsistent with the modern desire for "open negotiations."

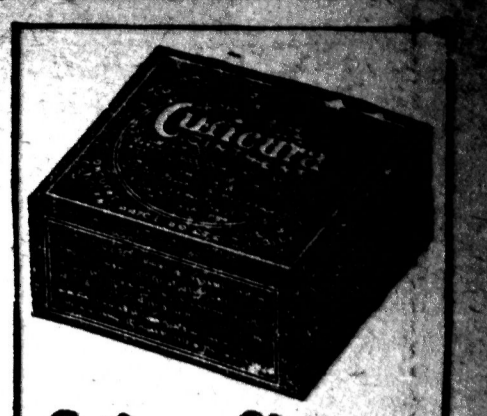
Only to-night is an official account available of last Friday's proceedings and the grounds on which the men rejected the Government's offer. The official report shows that the men accepted the Government's proposals, but would not consent to the Government's proposal of a sliding scale, but want it based on the highest rate of wages instead of the average rate. They rejected the sliding scale on the ground that other factors are involved besides the cost of living. They also demand increases retroactive to August and the inclusion of the Irish railwaymen in the settlement.

Likewise nothing was divulged to-night as to the nature of the Government's concessions, except that they concern details and do not affect the broad principles involved.

The negotiating committee of the Railwaymen's Union, together with members of the executive committee, discussed for four hours to-night their new position. Some of the delegates were emphatic in declaring that mere modification of the details and the removal of some of the anomalies would not meet the demands of their branches, and that only acceptance by the Government of the full terms would justify them in voting for a settlement. The fact, however, that there was no abrupt rejection of the Government's compromise was considered a hopeful sign.

SHORT ITEMS OF THE NEWS OF THE DAY

Frauds Involving Many Million Dollars in U.S. Gov't. Shipbuilding. POST FOR WILSON Alpine Avalanches Sweep Off Farm Houses, Kill Tourists.

Two women were arrested in Toronto charged with robbery with violence. Western University, London, governors propose to erect two new buildings.

The frozen body of Wm. Gilland was found in his home near Cardinal, with a bullet wound under the chin, penetrating to the brain. Chatham Board of Education will ask that the School Act be amended to permit of compulsory surgical treatment of children when minor physical defects interfere with proper schooling.

The Shah of Persia has left Paris for Brussels, where he will be the guest of the King of the Belgians. It has not yet been decided whether former Premier Asquith will stand for the vacant constituency of Paisley.

New York bakers complain that they cannot get as good results from U. S. Grain Corporation flour at \$10.50 a barrel as they do from other flour of higher prices.

Suit has been brought against Gabriele d'Annunzio in Paris by a maker of theatrical costumes to recover the cost of clothes given for clothes, for actors in one of the poet's plays.

The disappearance of Oscar P. Jessman, a bank messenger, with \$20,000 in cash, was announced by the police of Boston.

Richard C. MacLaurin, president of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, died at his home in Boston from pneumonia.

Frauds involving many millions of dollars in connection with the building of ships for the Government in Oregon, Washington and California, have been unearthed by Government investigators.

John Binarsky and John Sidusky, the first of the "bandits" to appear in the Toronto police court for sentence for highway robbery, were each sent to the Jail Farm for one year.

The corporation of McGill University has made physical training compulsory for all undergraduates during the first three years, with participation in sports recognized as an equivalent.

News has reached London that the British representative at Iskutsk has been ordered to leave the zone of hostilities owing to the threatening situation brought about by the advance of the Soviet forces. He has gone to Harbin.
