Advertisement for 'FOR THE FARMER' Collection of Annual Agricultural Statistics.

During the past three years the annual agricultural statistics of the Dominion have been based upon returns of areas sown and numbers of live stock on the farm, collected from individual farmers in the month of June. This information is obtained by means of a simple card-board schedule, which is distributed to farmers through the agency of the rural school teachers and children. The cards, when completed, are sent to the Provincial Government, which, after having them sorted into counties or districts, transmits them to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa for final compilation into totals by adding machinery. As schedules are now being distributed for the collection of this year's returns of the areas sown and numbers of farm animals, it is desirable to the serious attention of farmers to the duty of filling up the simple schedule required, and to return it to the Provincial Government before the end of June should apply for one either to the school teacher in his district, or to the Provincial Government, or to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa. It is the aim of the Dominion and Provincial statistical authorities to secure an annual return from every individual farmer in the Dominion. The issue of trustworthy annual agricultural statistics is important for all classes of industry, but to none is it of greater importance than to farmers themselves, who otherwise carry on their industry in the dark, and liable to be victimized by unscrupulous traders. The individual returns are published, and the information collected is not used in any way for taxation purposes. It is confidently expected that as farmers become better acquainted with the system organized for their benefit, they will realize the practical value to themselves of accurate agricultural statistics there will be a continuous increase in the proportion of returns. Meanwhile, it should be remembered that whatever degree of accuracy may attach to the figures issued is attributable to the estimate that has to be made from the actual returns.—E. H. Godfrey, Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa.

When the weather is very cold, during the midwinter months, many delicate frozen desserts can be made without the aid of the ice cream freezer and the usual rock salt and chopped ice. Simply turn the mixture to be frozen into the mould, stand outside for a stated length of time and the finished product will be found quite as satisfactory as though made with the freezer.

COFFEE CARAMEL PARFAIT. Scald one cupful of milk with two tablespoonfuls of ground coffee. Strain and mix with half a cupful of sugar that has been caramelized and mixed to a liquid with a little hot water. Beat the yolks of three eggs, sandy lemon-colored and add a pinch of salt and half a cupful of sugar. Blend gradually with the hot liquid and cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until well thickened. Remove from the fire, add a tablespoonful of cold water, and stir until the gelatine is dissolved. Cool, and when the mixture begins to stiffen whip well and fold in half a pint of chilled double cream, beaten solid. Turn into a fancy mould, set outside and let stand for four hours.

BANANA GRANITE. Press three peeled bananas through the ricer and add the juice of half a dozen lemons and half a pint of thick cream, whipped solid. Sweeten to taste with powdered sugar and add six finely crushed almonds that have been dried in the oven. Freeze as in the previous recipe.

CHOCOLATE MOUSE. Melt four ounces of unsweetened chocolate over hot water and add just enough sugar to make a thick serum. Whip one pint of cream solid, add a quarter of a teaspoonful of salt, a cupful of powdered sugar and slowly beat in the chocolate and a teaspoonful of vanilla extract. Whip again until the mixture will hold its shape and freeze as for the parfait.

MAPLE PARFAIT. Boil one cupful of maple syrup to 200 degrees and pour in a fine stream of the stiffly-whipped whites of two eggs. Continue to beat until thick and cold, then fold in half a pint of double cream whipped solid and half a cupful of chopped nut meats. Freeze as for the other recipes.

ANGEL PARFAIT. Boil three-quarters of a cupful of water, without stirring, until it "threads," or reaches on the candy thermometer. Then proceed as for the maple parfait. Chopped, drained Marshmallows may be substituted for the nuts and a little of the cordial for flavoring. If the nuts are used, flavor with vanilla extract to taste.

A HEALTHFUL DRINK. This is Convenient to Have On Hand in Warm Weather. As warm weather advances it is delightful to have a refreshing and healthful drink on hand. Try this: Over the washed peelings, eyes and cores of two fine apples, pour one generous quart of boiling water; allow to steep until cold; strain through cheesecloth, sweeten to taste, bottle and seal; tie down the corks and place bottles in a warm spot. It will be ripe in 24 hours.

RASPBERRY VINEGAR. Raspberries, pour one quart of good cider vinegar over two quarts of red raspberries, and set aside for two days. Drain off the liquid and pour it over a second two quarts of raspberries. Repeat this process once more, strain carefully, and add a pint of sugar to each pint of juice. Boil five minutes and bottle. In serving, allow two-thirds of water and a generous portion of shaved ice to two-thirds of the vinegar.

CONDENSED MILK HELPS. Sugar so high in price, why not use more condensed milk, as it is sugar and milk in one. For milk desserts use two tablespoonfuls of condensed milk to half a pint of water. Dissolve the milk first in a little warm water, then fill up to make your quantity. This produces milk containing butter-fat equal to those of fresh milk, and at the same time sugar in the same needed proportion as when the actual product is used.
