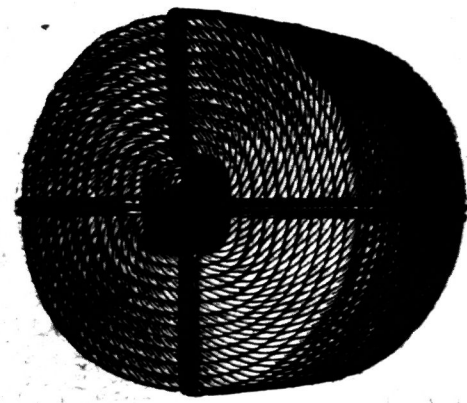

### Address to J. B. Boyd.

We are always pleased to note the success of our Jarvis old boys, and this week it is our privilege to make mention of the promotion of Joe Boyd, who has been assistant master in Duke of Connaught school, Toronto, for several years, and who has been promoted to the principalship of Victoria Park School in that city, the change to take effect when school opens in September. We congratulate J. B. on his promotion.

On leaving the Duke of Connaught the teaching staff presented him with a handsome lamp and the following address:

Toronto, June 25th, 1920.

MR. BOYD:—  
As the poet says 'Parting is such sweet sorrow—sometimes—but when the staff of the Duke of Connaught School heard you were likely to be severed from us there were two thrills, one sad, one glad. Sad because you certainly will be very much missed, and glad because it means so much to you and your family in the way of better remuneration, and better opportunities for doing a part in the world's work.

You were the first male representative on the staff, you knew all about the school from the first, and the whole staff knew they could appeal to you, feeling sure of getting real assistance, and unquestioned support in straightening out any difficulties.

In games and sports your ability to organize, entuse, and carry out are only too well known, and it will be very difficult to fill your place in that line.

Then in the Cadet work—the record you have made this year in winning a cup for the school will always stand out prominently, as well as the medals won for shooting in past years and the way you got the boys interested in the subject of drill.

In social doings with the teachers in pre-war days, you were also a leader, but as you are remaining in the profession, and not going too far away, we shall still count you on our list.

The pupils will miss you in the school competitions, as you were recognized by all the boys, and the other masters as a genuine sport, and your decisions were looked upon as straight and fair.

The teachers cannot go with you into your new field of labour, but that you may be often reminded of their thoughts of you, they ask you to accept this lamp, to light your way and keep bright the memories of the happy times spent in and about the Duke of Connaught school during the past seven and a half years.

The staff all join in wishing you every success in your new position, and also express their pleasure that the Board of Education recognize your ability and worth in appointing you Principal of the East End Forest School. They also express the hope that you and Mrs. Boyd (and family) may long be spared to enjoy the comfort and satisfaction of your new home so convenient to your new work.
