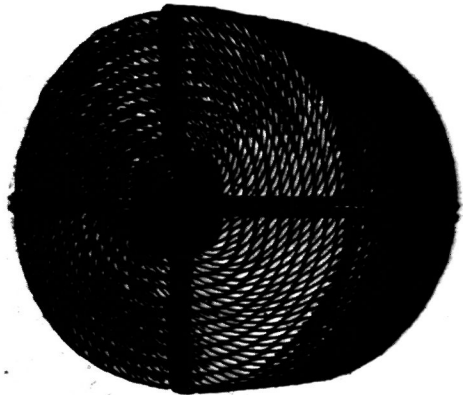

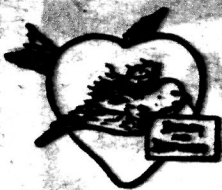
Mr. Slack, of Springvale, spent Sunday at Mr. Martin Anderson's.
