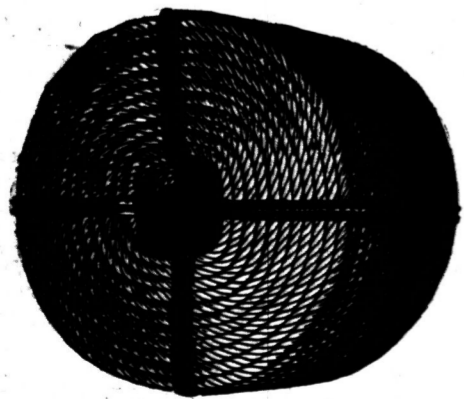

BANK OF HAMILTON

Employees Presented With Life
Insurance Policies.

The staff of the Bank of Hamilton have been presented with life insurance policies paid for by the bank under the group insurance plan, covering practically everyone in its service, under which those continuously in the bank's employ for one year and over are insured in steadily increasing amounts until the maximum amount of \$3,000 is reached. This insurance, which was arranged without cost to any of those covered, is in addition to the pension fund covering aged and disabled members of the staff, as well as widows and orphans, and is one more evidence of the interest which the directors of the bank take in the welfare and future of those who work for the Bank of Hamilton.
