## Higher Gas Rates At Tillsonburg

By practically a unanimous vote the ratepayers of Tillsonburg yesterday voted by a majority of 419 to permit the Dominion Natural Gas, Limited, to increase the rates from 35 to 40 cents per 1,000 at the first of the year and 50 cents per 1000 for the remainder of their franchise. In return the company agrees to spend \$80,000 in the vicinity of Tillsonburg in the next five years in the drilling of new wells and the laying of adequate pipe lines to assure a first-class service to its consumers.

## Hung Himself In Cayuga Jail

**George Badley, Awaiting Trial For Murder of His Sister, Suicides in Cell.**

CAYUGA, June 8—George Badley, of Rainham Township, awaiting trial here for the murder of his sister, Elizabeth, on May 17, committed suicide in Haldimand County jail about 6 o'clock this evening by hanging himself to a bar of his cell with a towel.

Badley was generally supposed to have been mentally weak and to-day two specialists came up from Toronto and examined him with a view to preparing a report for the crown. The test, it is believed, upset the accused somewhat. An extra turnkey had been employed at the jail since Badley was placed there. An inquest was opened this evening by Dr. Snider, coroner.

## Big Day At Hagersville

Good Racing and Two Baseball Tournaments.

Hagersville had one of the most successful days in its history last Thursday. The weather was ideal and there was an extra large crowd present to witness the races, which were all well filled and were the best ever held there. Five events were on the card. In the 2.10 class J. Rice's (Dunnville) Ash Look and Willis Woodland took first and second money. Frank Bogash, Jr., third. Everett's Hal H. (Simcoe) won the 2.18 class in straight heats. Paddy Patchen was the winner of the 2.25 class, Robert C. second and Alvin Merrill third. The other events were a classified race and a named race.

Seven teams were entered in the baseball tournament, but the four county league teams withdrew, not wishing to jeopardize their amateur standing in the O. B. A. A. Therefore the committee decided on a second tournament for the county league teams. The first was won by the Quarry team of Hagersville, Simcoe taking second money. Jarvis and Hagersville then competed in the league affair, Jarvis winning 10 to 8. Caledonia won from Rainham Centre 1-0. Owing to darkness Jarvis and Caledonia divided first and second prize, each team getting an order for baseball goods to the value of \$25.

It was a great day for Hagersville and we understand that the committee came out considerably ahead financially.

## Seven-Mill Levy For Norfolk County

SIMCOE—June 7.—The county levy for general purposes, including the building of the Port Dover bridge, will be seven mills, and for county highway construction three and a half mills, plus a debenture issue of \$60,000. Up till January Norfolk County has spent on county road construction and equipment \$200,475.94, of which \$92,312.18 has been provided by the Government and \$108,163.77 by the county. The provincial county roads are being built of tarria bound macadam. The County Council decided that the roadway construction account should be kept separate from the general account and assimilate its own interest on overdraft.

Jonathan Porter, treasurer for Norfolk County, has been appointed clerk and accountant for the county farm and home. His salary will total about \$2,000 a year.

Oliver Robinson, jailer, was appointed surveyor of the buildings on the county square.

Plans and specifications for the bascule and trunion bridge at Port Dover are under way.

The contract for painting the exterior woodwork at the Industrial Home has been let, the work to be done this month.

William Moore, father of Mrs. Bruce Eaid, of London, is making little progress towards recovery. He was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage more than a week ago.

There are but 51 inmates in the Norfolk County Industrial Home.

Two Simcoians have been summoned in error for speeding on the Hamilton-Toronto highway. They are Harold McCall and Delbert Woolley, and both have been obliged to go before the local magistrate and make depositions to this effect.
