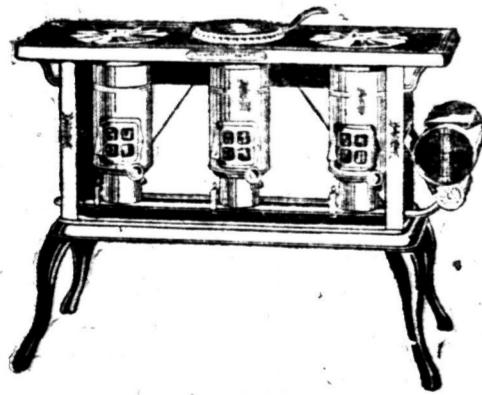

## The General Sessions

### Two Jury and Two Non-Jury Cases on the Docket

The General Sessions of the Peace opened at the Court House, Cayuga, on Tuesday with two jury and two non-jury cases on the docket.

Freeman vs. Culp, a jury case, in which parties in the west end of the County are interested, is an action for price of some hay and seed. This action is, by consent postponed owing to the illness of the plaintiff, Arrell & Arrell for plaintiff. Sloan and Slater, of Hamilton, for defendant.

The other jury case is that of Stengel vs. Bowman, an action for damages for the seduction of the plaintiff's daughter. Judgment for plaintiff for \$400 and costs. S. E. Lindsay, of Hagersville, for plaintiff. Kelly and Porter, of Simcoe, for defendant.

Gibson vs. Bennett, a non-jury case, is an action brought by Mrs. Gibson, of Dunnville, for damages arising out of an auto accident, which happened last July. The plaintiff at the time was driving a horse and buggy, and was about to turn, at the junction of Cedar and Canal Sts., Dunnville, when she collided with defendant's auto, which was making the turn at the same time. Each party alleges negligence on the part of the other. W. T. Robb, for plaintiff. J. C. Payne for defendant.

The other non-jury case is that of Parks (administrator of the estate of the late Patrick Maloney) vs. National Gas Co., an action for the price of drilling wells. The dispute is over the time spent in drilling wells for defendant company, and the amount of work performed. W. T. Robb for plaintiff. R. S. Colter for defendant.

### Haldimand to Have U. F. O. Candidate

There was a large gathering of U. F. O. representatives, in the town hall, Cayuga, on Monday evening of last week, when several matters of interest were up for discussion.
